Can any Democrat so far

publican majority in Ver-
mont dropped to 14,163.
This year, after two years'

by the republicans of the 8th
Virginia District. Colonel Mc-
Caull is one of the best known
Republicans in Virginia, and
as a campaign speaker has
but few who can equal him.
He now resides in Culpeper
county.

Thorough organization in
the 9th district will secure a
victory for the Republican
party such as has never been
known. Every precinct should
be thoroughly organized, and
the forces lined up for action.
You can not begin this work
too early.

The sugar men of Louisi-
ana have read the riot act to
the Democrats of that
State. They say they will
favor the election of no man
who is not pledged to the
protective policy, and who
will not pledge himself to
vote for a protectionist for
and who will not pledge him-
self to vote for a protection-
ist for Speaker of the House.

Farmers will soon begin
to miss the reciprocity treat-
ies. In 1893 Cuba bought
from us \$10,000,000 worth
of provisions and breadstuffs
alone, these goods being ad-
mitted free of duty into Cuba
from the United States. But
now that we are taxing Cu-
ban sugar, they will tax our
farm products, buy more
from other countries, and less
from us.

The Bedford Democrat has
boasted the nomination of
Peter J. O'Key and comes out

for the Populist candidate
for Congress in the Sixth
district, Mr. Rucker. J. H.
Hoge is the Republican can-
didate, and C. A. Heermans,
a candidate for nomination
before the convention that
nominated Mr. Hoge, comes
out against him. The politi-
cal situation in the Sixth is
somewhat mixed.

Hon. A. G. Dayton has
been nominated by the Re-
publicans of the 2nd West
Virginia District to make
the race for Congress against
tariff Bill Wilson. Ex-Presi-
dent Harrison made a speech
at the convention which nomi-
nated Mr. Dayton. The
Baltimore Sun correspondent
says the convention was one
of the most enthusiastic ever
held in that district, and
that ex-President Harrison
received an ovation when he
appeared and spoke.

It will be remembered that
the Democratic convention
held in the Ninth Virginia
District, in which "Cyclone"
Jim Marshall was knocked
out by a bogus telegram and
Judge Morrison was nomi-
nated, was again called together,
and Judge Morrison was a-
gain nominated. While the
second convention was in ses-
sion, a delegate got the floor
and read a telegram from a
friend who said: "Hold on
until I get there. I will be in
on the next train with a load
of liquor." The convention
promptly took a recess, and
waited for the "liquor." It
was such a disgraceful affair,
that one of our ministers
referred to it in scathing
terms in his sermon last
Sunday, and declared that
it was a disgrace to vote for
men of such character.—Shen-
andoah Press.

Vermont Went Republican by 27,310.

Rutland, Vt., Sept. 10.—Returns
from small towns in the State,
received by the Town Clerk here, show
the Republican majority to be 27,310
and the plurality 28,356. Official re-
turns will change these figures very
little. The Senate is a Republican
unit, and the House stand as follows:
Republicans, 23; Democrats, 9;
Populists, 1. Three towns made no
choice.

One of the most disastrous fires
that ever occurred in Roanoke city
broke out at 11 o'clock Sunday morn-
ing in the Bridge-water Building, a
large three-story cased brick struc-
ture, which, with its contents, was en-
tirely destroyed within an hour and
a half. The origin of the fire is un-
known. The losses on the contents
of the building aggregate about
\$24,000, with insurance of about
\$5,000.

The building belonged to the
Home Building and Conveyance
Company, and cost \$32,000, insur-
ance, \$10,000. The dwelling of A.
M. Robertson, Jr., was damaged \$200
covered by insurance. Several of the
firemen were overcome by heat
and were carried away by their coun-
trades.

The pot hunters of Vermont, a
few years ago, had nearly extermin-
ated all the game in that State. The
Legislature thereof then enacted a
law forbidding the killing of game
there until 1890. The effect has been
that deer and other kinds of game
are almost as plentiful there now as
when the State was first settled. Un-
less a similar law be made in Vir-
ginia, all manner of game will soon be
extinct here; it is nearly so now.
If the deer, wild turkeys, partridges,
pheasants and woodcock in the State
were protected for two or three years
there would be plenty of them for
every Virginian.

MAINE HEARD FROM.
Republicans Carry the State
by the Biggest Majority
on Record.
NOT A DEMOCRATIC COUNTY.

Republicans Have 137 Out of 151 Rep-
resentatives and a Solid Senate.
Augusta, Me., Sept. 11.—The Re-
publican regard the result of yester-
day's election as the biggest victory
they have ever achieved in this State.
The vote for Governor, which two
years ago was 130,000, is reduced
15,000 to 20,000, but even with this
it is a record that Cleaves has received
70,000 votes.

In every one of the sixteen coun-
ties of the State the Democracy has
been defeated.

Every city in the State has prob-
ably gone Republican, which is some-
thing phenomenal.

The returns show nothing but Re-
publican gains. The returns so far
indicate that Johnson, Democrat,
will not get over 35,000 votes, to 55,
000 cast for him two years ago, and
this may be reduced by later returns.

All four of the Republican Con-
gressmen are elected by largely in-
creased majorities.

The Republicans have carried both
branches of the Legislature, electing
a solid Senate, which two years ago
stood thirty Republicans and one
Democrat.

In the House of Representatives,
which consists of 151 members, and
which two years ago stood 107 Re-
publicans and 44 Democrats, the Re-
publicans, it is believed, have elect-
ed 137 members, while the remain-
der have been elected by the Demo-
crats and Populists.

Election Notice.
An election will be held at the Court House
Marion, Va., on Saturday, October 6th, to
take sense of the voters of the Town of Mar-
ion, for the purpose of issuing of bonds of
the Town of Marion, for an amount not ex-
ceeding Three Thousand Five Hundred Dol-
lars for the purpose of supplying the town of
Marion with water in accordance with the fol-
lowing resolution of the Town Council adopt-
ed at a meeting held Sept. 25th 1894.
Resolved: That it is hereby ordered that the
Town Sergeant and the following Judges of
election, who are hereby appointed for the
purpose, viz. W. P. Francis, Jas. F. Nickols
and L. N. Luther, shall upon a poll and hold
an election, as provided by law, to take the
sense of the qualified voters of the town of
Marion, Va., as to whether the Council shall
issue bonds to an amount not exceeding three
thousand and five hundred dollars for the
purpose of supplying the town of Marion with
water by extending the water
pipes to the sycamore spring or
other spring near there; and convenient to
be connected with the present pipe lines, the
said bonds to bear interest at a rate not ex-
ceeding six per cent per annum, payable semi-
annually, to be in such amount, denomination,
as the Council shall designate, and to
run for a period not exceeding thirty years
from the date of issue, and in manner to
comply with the provisions of the Charter of
the said Town and the general laws of the
State not modified or changed by said Charter.
And it is further ordered that said election
be held at the Court House for said County
in Marion, Va., on Saturday, October 6th,
1894, and in the manner prescribed by law,
and further that notice of said election be
published for four weeks successively in one
or more of the newspapers published in the
town of Marion, as provided by the Charter
of the town as amended by an act approved
March 31st 1884, A. T. LITTLE, Recorder,
A. H. ATKINS, Mayor.
