



**VIRGINIANS OBJECT.**

The Virginia delegation had an interview with Chairman Wilcox, of the Ways and Means committee, the other day in which they urged upon him the necessity of retaining in the proposed new tariff measure the duty of twenty five cents a bushel upon potatoes. Mr. Murray said that this was the only protection that was afforded to the farmers of the Atlantic coast, or at least that portion of it tributary to the Norfolk market. They have to pay protected prices upon articles that they consume, but the tax upon potatoes did not, it was asserted, raise the price of this great product to the people. Norfolk handles about 1,000,000 barrels of potatoes annually, and the property interests of the household average are valued at \$3,500,000. It was particularly desired, it was said, to protect the farmers there against the importation of Nova Scotia potatoes, which come in ballast, paying but little or no freight, and the labor in their production and the value of land upon which they are raised being less than in the United States, the producers of potatoes here would be placed at a disadvantage if they were compelled to meet this Canadian competition.

**It Has Passed the White House.**

The new tariff bill has passed the White House, so the Washington correspondents say. In other words, Grover Cleveland has examined the several schedules, has invited a few of his intimate political friends to look over the work, and the announcement is now made that the bill in all its parts has been fashioned after the idea of the Chicago platform, and that the author of the White House has pronounced it good and he himself is well pleased.

Having passed the White House it will next go to the legislative branches of the government for approval, unless a sufficient number of independent Senators should be found to protest against this measure of destruction. The bill, as it stands approved by President Cleveland, is by all odds the most radical and most dangerous piece of legislation that has emanated from the Democratic party since the first attempt of Representative Morrison to make a horizontal reduction of the tariff. The effect of this bill will be far more disastrous to industry and labor than any of the former propositions, for two reasons. First, it is in itself more radical, and in the second place the present critical condition of our manufactures makes the passage of the bill at this time a wanton and reckless blow at the very foundation of our industrial progress. It will destroy thousands of industries and build up none. It will close half the mills and factories and work-hops in several branches of manufacture and open none. It will throw hundreds of thousands of wage earners out of work, and reduce the wages of all. It will leave human misery and industrial wreckage where twelve months ago the Democratic party found human contentment and industrial prosperity.

Such is the measure that has passed the White House and is awaiting the signature of the House of Representatives.—N. Y. Press.

**Ex Secretary Rusk Dead.**

Viroqua, Wis., Nov. 21.—Ex-Gov. erior Jeremiah Rusk, Secretary of Agriculture in President Harrison's Cabinet, died here at 8 o'clock this morning. He had been ill for a long time and his case had been diagnosed as inflammation of the prostate gland resulting in abscess. He had several operations performed but has failed gradually but constantly for many weeks.

The S A & O. Sued for the Death of Engineer Allen.

John H. Goss, administrator of the estate of W. A. Allen, deceased, filed suit in the Hastings court Monday for \$10,000 damages, for the death of Engineer Allen, who was killed in the wreck on Horton's summit some months ago.

Suit was filed through Judge G. W. Ward, of Avingdon, attorney in the case.

It will be remembered that the wreck in which Allen was killed was caused by the track's giving away on the summit. The engine and several cars rolled down an embankment. Engineer Allen was pinched under the engine and so badly injured that he died in about twelve hours from the time the wreck occurred.

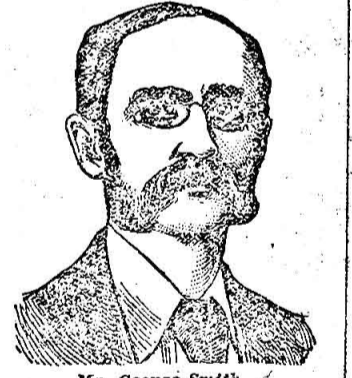

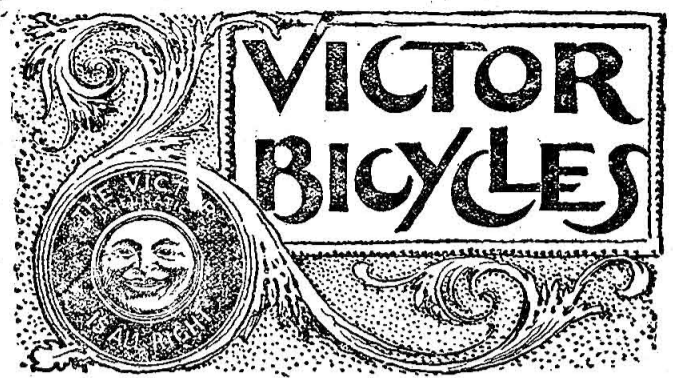

MEETING OF MARION BAR

Hon. Jno. A. Buchanan and Capt. J. F. Sheffey Endorsed.

At a meeting of the Marion Bar, held on the 22nd day of November, 1893, Judge A. P. Cole was elected chairman of the meeting and Wm. O. Pendleton was appointed secretary.

The object of the meeting was explained by Judge Fudge to be for the purpose of endorsing Hon. Jno. A. Buchanan is the unanimous choice of this Bar for a seat on the Supreme bench, to be filled by the incoming Legislature.

Resolved, also, That Hon. John P. Sheffey is the unanimous choice of this Bar for the high and responsible trust of Judge of the 16th Judicial Circuit, for the term beginning 1st January, 1895.

That in view of their noted ability, their high attainments as practitioners and their purity in life and heart, the election of these two gentlemen to these positions will insure most perfect satisfaction to the Marion Bar, and the bright-est sons to the state at large.
