

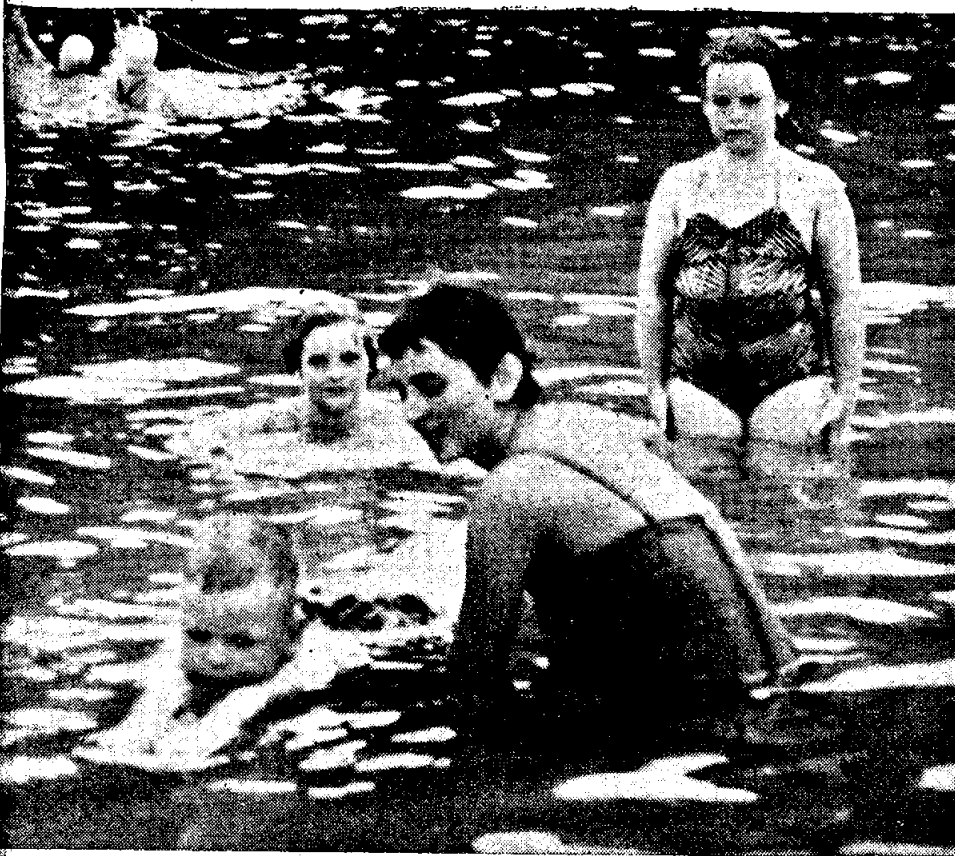

### 1954 Burley Crop To Be Measured In Smyth County

The county chairman of the agricultural stabilization and conservation committee, George DeBusk, is requesting full cooperation of Smyth County farmers as ASC reporters commence the big job of measuring 1954 tobacco acreages.

"Getting tobacco acreage properly measured should be just as important to producers as it is to the Department of Agriculture," Mr. DeBusk says. "For that reason producers should accept the responsibility of assisting ASC reporters in any way possible. Producers are responsible for showing all tobacco fields to the reporter. Failure to show a field may result in 100 per cent reduction in the farm tobacco allotment for next year."

Mr. DeBusk estimated that there will be 1,350 tobacco farms to be measured in Smyth County this year. Mr. DeBusk also pointed out that the penalty for Burley tobacco in 1954 is at present set at 21c per pound, but pending laws in Congress may raise this to 26c per pound.

### Walter Boone Named Marion Police Chief

Lieutenant Will Fill Wolfe's Unexpired Term

Walter Boone, who has served the town as police lieutenant for some time, last Friday was named chief of the town police to fill the unexpired term of the late Ralph Wolfe.

The appointment was made at the regular meeting of Marion Town Council.

Council members also authorized street repairs to cost approximately \$16,000 with Engineer James Ritter to advertise for bids. There was some discussion about repairing North Main Street, but no action was taken on this matter.

A group of four people, Mr. and Mrs. Claude Slomp, Mrs. Claude Buchanan and Herbert Roten, appeared requesting action on a petition for a sewer line on Preston Ave. They stated they had presented the petition about three months ago, that it was signed by eight of the 10 owners who could be served by the line and they wanted immediate action. Sewer committee chairman George Greer pointed out that the town has a limited budget on which to operate and the council tries to put the sewer lines where they will do the most good for the largest number of families.

Councilman Wythe Hull told the group there are sections of town that have been trying to get sewer lines for 15 or 20 years and still do not have them.

The matter of the change of the contract with the county for operating the radio hookup was continued, with Mayor Walter B. Jackson to continue negotiations.

Lonnie Hall was granted a taxi license, and the application of L. H. Nelkirk for a taxi license was continued, pending proper publication of notice of intent.

The mayor was authorized to see to the proper distribution and publication of resolutions on the deaths of J. B. Richardson and Ralph Wolfe.

Mayor Jackson told Council the Royal Oak Presbyterian Church trustees had stated they would like to continue lending the town the \$11,000 as the church is doing at present. Council members discussed the tight money situation in the banks, deciding that the four per cent being paid the church is less than the town would have to pay if it went to a bank to borrow money on short term loans. Council voted to continue borrowing from the church.

Following adjournment council members remained for a secret discussion of some sort, with the mayor stating that this was not a regular session and was not to be covered by the press.

Present were Mayor Jackson, Councilmen K. K. Snider, Walter Francis, W. J. Andrews, Beattie Gwyn, Greer and Hull; Engineer Ritter; Town Treasurer James B. Richardson, Recorder H. P. Gills; Town Attorney Francis Hoge, and Chief Boone.

#### Stadium Drive Is Renewed To Complete Facilities

The drive started last year to build a stadium for Marion was renewed this week in an effort to secure the final \$9,000 to complete the field and build the necessary facilities at the stadium.

"We started this drive and were able to raise only \$41,762.95 for the new stadium," Pat Jennings stated this week. "The stadium went under construction with the shorter amount and now we need the final amount to build permanent seats for baseball, dressing rooms, a concession stand and sanitary conditions for the field," Jennings added. "We are renewing the drive to complete the job we started."

"The final amount will be used to build seats, sanitary facilities, dressing rooms, a concession stand and other small jobs) the stadium now looking only half finished," R. E. Moore stated.

At the present time the officials of Emory and Henry College and VPI have expressed their interest in bringing college football to Marion. The interest seems high to give this outlet to Marion and bring these games here.

The first raised amount was used for the following: grading, \$9,779.50; construction materials, \$10,618.96; lights, \$15,500.09; labor, \$5,399.70; miscellaneous expense, \$464.44.

The lights that were installed afforded Marion with the best lighted field in this area and one with the most lights. The miscellaneous expense was used for the bond issue and for printing purposes.

Plans are being completed to begin a person to person campaign next week to raise the needed money.

"We fully realize that many people were unable to give last year and many others could not give what they wanted, due to personal reasons," Treasurer Lantz Haywood said this week. "For this reason, we are optimistic of reaching our final goal, the \$50,000 architects estimated necessary to give Marion a stadium, second to none for all purposes."

#### Watch to Be Given Blood Donor in Marion Tuesday

A watch will be given to someone who gives a pint of blood when the bloodmobile from the regional blood center in Roanoke comes to Marion next Tuesday.

The collection will be made between 11 a. m. and 5 p. m. at the Anderson Building.

The watch will be given by people interested in the continuing success of the blood program, and will not be purchased from Red Cross funds, says Robert Nelson, Smyth County blood program chairman.

Mr. Nelson urges prospective

donors to make appointments to give blood as the need is extremely urgent. Blood stocks in Roanoke need to be replenished if civilian, military and blood derivative needs are to be met, he says.

#### Streets to Be Resurfaced Are Listed

Plans for summer resurfacing of streets in Marion have been announced with the major jobs being Main Street from the college to Pendleton St., Johnston Street from North Main to Stage St. and the Upper Circle of Cemetery Rd.

These three will be surfaced with plant mix, with the cost estimate being \$1,907 for Johnston Street leading to the new school, \$5,456 for Main and \$651 for Cemetery Rd.

Single seal treatment will be put on South Churen from Sever to town limits, on West Main from Poston to dead end, on Greenway from South Main to dead end, on Dalton from Greenway to Clinton, on Clinton from Dalton to dead end, on Hulldale from South Main to Cumberland, on Cumberland from Clinton to the east end, on Staley from North Main to Sayers, on Sayers from Staley to Park Blvd., on South Holston from North Main to dead end, on Catron from Prescott to Sprinkle, on Sprinkle from Dover to Catron, and on Wolfe from Dover to Catron.

Estimate for the double seal treatment is \$4,535 and for the single seal \$3,100. Total cost estimate including 1,607 gallons of tack coat is \$15,936.

#### Weatherman Says No Rain, Mayor Says No Gardens

Marion's water pressure again is low and town officials today placed a ban on using town water for watering lawns, flower beds and gardens until further notice.

Mayor Walter Jackson this Thursday stated that "Due to low pressure and shortage of water in high points in town, no water will be used for watering lawns, flower beds and gardens until further notice." This ban takes effect this Thursday.

Lack of rain in recent weeks, resulting in a dwindling supply at the town springs, resulted in the ban. As soon as the supply is adequate again the ban will be lifted.

### Barlow Charged With Hit and Run Driving

Thomas Lee Barlow of Kennett Square, Penna., and Cross Creek is to appear in Trial Justice Court this Saturday to answer charges of hit and run driving and of driving under the influence of an intoxicant or self administered drug.

The charges grew out of a wreck last Saturday about 1:15 p. m. near the old junk yard at the Cedars. A 1948 Pontiac driven by Everett L. Carheart, Birmingham, N. Y., was proceeding west on Rt. 11 when a Ford came around the corner, swung into the westbound lane and hit the Pontiac. The Ford was driven off on a side road to Laurel Springs and Scratch Gravel, says Trooper S. M. Norris, who investigated the accident along with Trooper V. W. Hinton and town officers. Later that afternoon Trooper Norris found the car on the town parking lot. It answered the description of the hit and run car and was damaged on the left side. Witnesses identified it as the car involved in the wreck. Trooper Hinton found Barlow, also identified by witnesses, as the driver, asleep at a house in Marion. The man is lodged in the Smyth County jail pending the hearing Saturday.

Damage to the Pontiac was estimated at \$200.

### Testerman Is Given \$500 and Six Months For Reckless Driving

Robert Franklin Testerman was fined \$500 and costs and given six months on a reckless driving count in the Saturday session of Trial Justice Court in Marion.

Testerman was involved in an automobile accident, and the car he was operating skidded 564 feet into the home of Mrs. F. L. Hicks. The accident occurred at the west end of Atkins. State Trooper S. M. Norris stated that the car turned over several times and hit limbs of a tree about 18 feet in the air. The car came to rest against the side of the home of Mrs. Hicks, and Testerman was thrown from the car unhurt.

Testerman stated that he put the vehicle in second gear in an effort to pull out of the slide and get the car under control.

Roger Stone's driving permit was revoked for 60 days as a result of a reckless driving charge. Stone was involved in an accident in Sugar Grove and was charged with, in addition to the reckless driving, driving drunk and leaving the scene of an accident. The latter two charges were dismissed because of lack of evidence.

Allen F. Barker was found not guilty of reckless driving. R. C. Hamby was fined \$50 and costs and given 30 days in jail, suspended, on payment of a bad check.

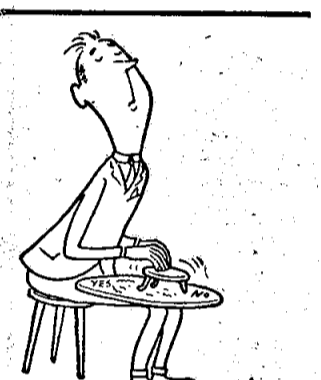

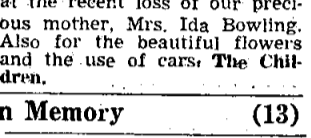

"King" one man's best friend, was considered the king of dogs to his master.

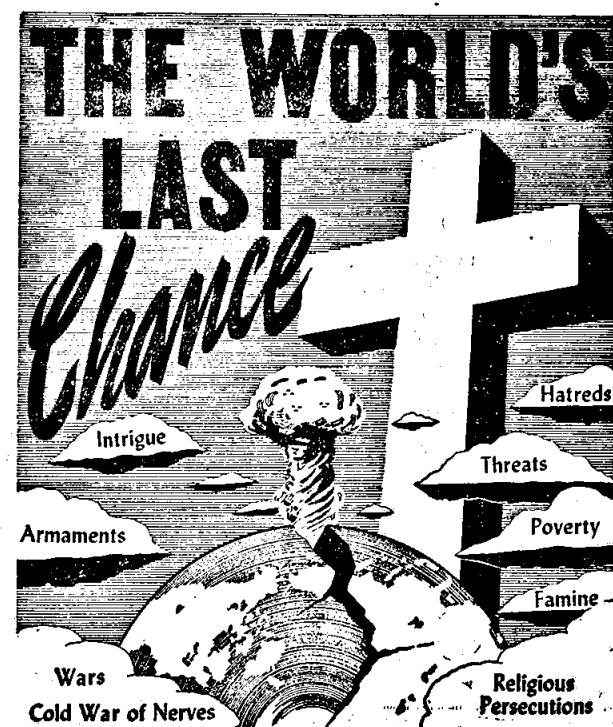
### Melvin C. Holmes Participates In Musical Contest

Several summers ago, some people from South Carolina made us realize how fortunate we are to have the park. Now a family from Wytheville does the same thing. Human nature seems to be such that we have to be shown the same thing over and over. Perhaps it is the summer weather that dulls our sense of perception.

One of the major objectives of any Chamber of Commerce is to attract more business and more tourists to a place. The following ideas are offered as a "shot in the arm" for any one who has an imagination and some initiative, here in our wonderful Mountain Empire of Virginia.

We learned at the tourist school conducted here recently that tourism is Virginia's third largest crop. We, also, were told to consider these out-of-state people as our guests. And truly, they are our guests. We advertise our state in all its phases as an attraction, and we invite people to visit us. We hang out our shingles, Over-Night Guests, et cetera. Therefore, it is our duty and obligation to treat these visitors as guests and not just as tourists.

What catches the eye of the tourists or guests and then sets his tongue to wagging about the places he has been?

Some like the handicraft of a section which has a flavor all of its own; some like the scenery; some, the kind of climate; some like the kind of sports the section supplies; some the mountains; others like the seashore; while many like the people. Many more likes could be listed.

Having traveled around a little bit, one of the things that impresses me the most about a section is the originality used in advertising a locality or business.

Not too many things of this nature are seen back East; however, one does see novelty trucks advertising the firms' wares, such as a large fruit jar, a peanut, and so on. In Hickory, N. C., was seen a large bureau, used by the Chamber of Commerce, and a huge chair at High Point, N. C.

But out West, especially in Southern California, a real tourist mecca, are many unique places of business.

Some of the clever places I recall were restaurants built to carry out the idea of the food in which they specialized, such as juice drink stands which looked like a big orange or a lemon; a coffee shop like a huge coffee pot, steam puffing out the spout; a large round bean bowl; chicken dinners in a large hen; hot-dog stands, the houses being built the

shape of huge dogs, (one had a pipe in his mouth which emitted smoke,) an ice cream stand built like a huge hoot owl; the famous restaurant in Hollywood built like a brown derby; a large green frog restaurant; a red apple dance hall; and a bakery shop which used Dutch wind mills to designate their places of business.

Why could not this section use some originality?

Some ideas that would lend themselves to be reproduced or used for "atmosphere" for a shop, a restaurant, or a lodge: cow bell, wagon bed with old painted wagon wheels for outside decorations, powder horn, half-a-bushel, little brown jug, lantern, coffee mill, gourd, wooden churn, wooden wash tub, dinner pot, brass kettle, stagecoach, covered wagon, hoop skirt, poke bonnet, old oaken bucket, old water wheel mill, spring house, and many, many more.

Anything along the rustic type of architecture fits in with our mountain setting.

May I leave this parting suggestion: many of you town and county citizens will be taking vacation trips this summer, as well as in future summers, since you are going to spend your money in some other part of Virginia or out of state. (I believe in going places), why not take along some of our Marion folders and other advertising materials of our section to advertise our section wherever you go?

Maybe we would get part of that money back sometime. I root for Virginia.

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**Other Folks' Ideas**

**MORE THAN REPAIRS**

(The Christian Science Monitor)

Personal contacts are always helpful in keeping friendships in repair. That fact alone would more than justify the announced visit of Prime Minister Churchill and Foreign Secretary Eden to the White House. The recent ragged state of British-American understanding had become desperately dangerous.

American opinion saw no reason to prove to India that the Communists would not respond to reasonableness at Geneva. Britons saw no reason for the popular assumption in the United States that Indochina was just another Korea. Not only has public opinion in the two countries failed to meet, but at times officials were doing little to lessen misunderstanding.

But now Secretary Dulles has announced a policy which, while setting up a line the United States considers vital to defend in the Far East, backs away from intervention in Indochina. Indeed, this policy appears to come very close to that the British have held. With that gap bridged, with the object lesson of Geneva fresh in mind, and with both nations taking more realistic positions, it should be possible to get better teamwork for new construction.

While there is no agenda for Washington, the first project is expected to be a Pacific defense organization similar to NATO in Europe. The British have various problems in any such enterprise and less enthusiasm for it than have Americans. But Australia and Thailand have indicated their interest, and military experts have consulted about the practical steps required. We can hope not only for necessary repairs at Washington but for useful new building.

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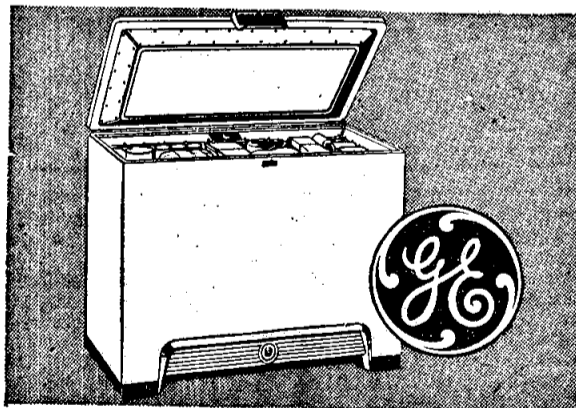
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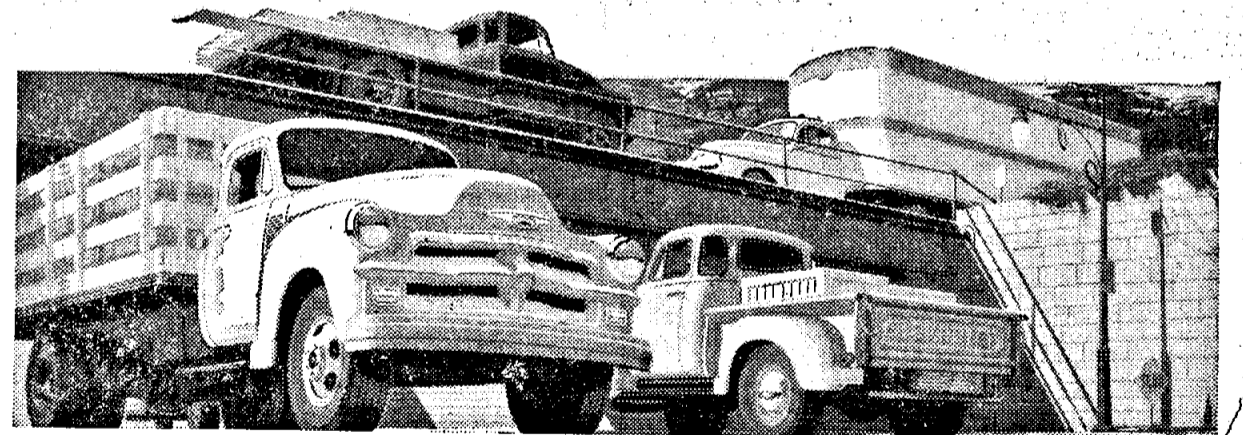

Fort Meade, Md., June 16 — Master Sgt. Gilbert O. Cumbow, a former presidential security guard of the late Franklin D. Roosevelt, has been selected as the "Second Army Outstanding Soldier of the Month" for June 14 to June 27.

He is the son of Jesse Cumbow of Marion. Sergeant Cumbow's permanent home is in Arlington, and he is stationed at the Army Chemical Center, Edgewood, Md.

Sergeant Cumbow is the second enlisted man chosen as the top soldier in the seven-state Army area. The "Outstanding Soldier" program is aimed at recognizing soldierly qualities, elevating standards of conduct and promoting esprit.

Attached to the 250th Military Police Company, Washington, D. C., in 1941 to 1943, Sergeant Cumbow served as security guard to President Roosevelt on state functions with many foreign diplomats. He recalls accompanying President Roosevelt to Mount Vernon for meetings with Madam Chiang Kai-shek and for White House conferences with Prime Minister Winston Churchill and the presidents of Bolivia and Czechoslovakia.

He is presently assigned as smoke generator technician, Munitions Division, Chemical Corps, Chemical and Radiological Laboratories.

During his stay at Fort George Meade, Md., Sergeant

Cumbow is assigned to the office of the commanding general as senior color bearer. For three days, however, the sergeant and his wife, the former Miss Ara M. Hoover of Washington, D. C., toured Washington, Baltimore and Annapolis, Md. in the company of their escort, Sergeant First Class Leo M. Ennis of Second Army Communication Center.

While in the Nation's capital Tuesday, Sergeant Cumbow met one of the senators from his home state, Harry Byrd, of Virginia. He also was introduced to Major General William M. Creasy, chief chemical officer, Department of the Army. Fort Meade special service office provided a tour of the United States Naval Academy on Wednesday and to complete three days of fun Sergeant Cumbow and Mrs. Cumbow attended the New York Yankee-Baltimore Oriole baseball game after a tour of Baltimore Thursday.

As a customary, Sergeant Cumbow was introduced to Brigadier General Hugh P. Harris, Second Army chief of staff, by Lieutenant James R. Hetherington, assistant public information officer. He will be presented with a personal letter from Lieutenant General Floyd L. Parks, second army commander, commending him on his selection as the "Second Army Outstanding Soldier." All of the events have taken

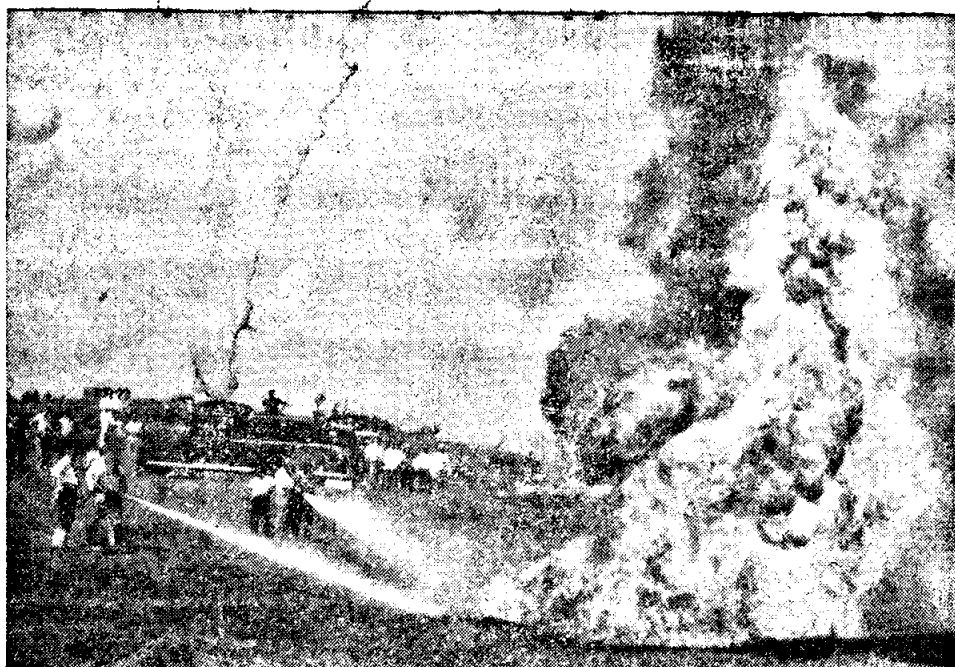

Last Saturday their 19-year old daughter, Evelyn Mae, a junior at the University of Maryland, was married at the post chapel at the Army Chemical Center. She is majoring in accounting. The Cumbows have two younger children, Edward, 14, a student at McDonough Military Academy near Baltimore, and Merla Mae, 7.

A World War II and Korean War veteran, Sergeant Cumbow has been in the Army 16 years. Enlisting in 1937, he served as an infantryman until 1941. Cumbow was assigned to the Military Police until 1948 and finally to the Chemical Corps.

Forty months of his enlistment have been spent overseas. He has served in Panama, Virgin Islands, New Guinea, Japan and the Philippines. During his most recent overseas tour of duty Sergeant Cumbow was in Korea with United Nations forces for 16 months.

He wears the Pacific Campaign Medal with three bronze stars, the Korean Service Medal with one silver star, the Korean Presidential Unit Citation Badge, the Philippine Presidential Unit Citation Badge and several World War II and Korean War Service ribbons.
