Government Will Attack Cashier.

Bristol, Tenn., June 17.—It is announced that Walter D. Sutherland, the absconding cashier of the Clintwood National Bank at Clintwood, Dickenson county, recently captured and now in jail at Clintwood, will be prosecuted by the Government for alleged violations of the national banking laws.

The bank that suffered as a result of Sutherland's transactions has been absorbed by the private bank of Clintwood. It is said that among the papers discovered in the transfer of the bank was a note signed by Sutherland in which he indicated his abrupt departure by the expression, "Gone to tall timber." Sutherland is said to have been short in his receipts upwards of \$20,000.

The degrees given were Bachelor of Arts. Immense throngs crowded the campus and filled to overflowing the large gymnasium auditorium both Monday and Tuesday. The trustees, the faculty and many noted visitors occupied the platform, and the following honorary degrees were announced by President Chas. C. Weaver, having been conferred by the board of trustees:

Doctor of Divinity—Rev. I. P. Martin, Knoxville, Tenn., and Rev. S. D. Long, president Martha Washington College, Abingdon, Va.

After the Robertson Prize Medal Contest Monday, a most excellent alumni address was delivered by Dr. J. B. Hutton, of Knoxville, Tenn. This address was especially enjoyed because Mr. Hutton was a former Washington county boy with many friends and relatives yet in the community.

The chief feature of the exercises Tuesday was the literary address given to the Societies by Dr. G. F. Mellen, of Knoxville, Tenn. This gentleman is one of the South's acknowledged literary critics, who is pleased to call himself a "Farmer Journalist." His speech was a rare literary production and a treat to his audience, which, notwithstanding its immensity, gave him respectful and appreciative attention.

President Weaver was nearly in his congratulations to the audience for their good behavior and orderly conduct during the entire commencement.

High School Contest.

88 Representatives of the Southwest Virginia Schools Compete for Honors.

The annual contest of the High Schools of Southwest Virginia took place at Rural Retreat last week.

The meeting was attended by thirty-eight representatives from the various high schools and the people of the town and of the surrounding country gave evidence of their interest in school work by regular and general attendance. The meeting was a great success in every way and practically all the high schools between Roanoke and Bristol were represented by one or more students.

The contest showed plainly that the work of the schools during the past year has been of a high standard and that the literary arts have not been neglected. The thirty-eight pupils represented the schools in section "A" of the Southwest Virginia Association of secondary schools and colleges.

The exercises began last Thursday night and continued through Friday to Saturday morning. They consisted of contests in oratory, debate, declamation, recitation and essay. Carleton Penn, of Salem, was declared the successful orator and was awarded first honor in that contest. W. Killinger, of Rural Retreat, won in the debate; Miss Blanche Welch, of Elk Creek, in essay; Miss Ruth Croy, of Christiansburg, in reading; John Clark, of Meadow View, in declamation.

According to the plans of those in charge, each school division is asked to have a local contest in debate, essay, declamation, recitation, oration, etc., and to send the successful contestants to the annual district meeting.

The thirty-eight contestants, therefore, who were present at the meeting at Rural Retreat represent the pick of all the high schools of this large district and much importance was given to the meeting by the presence of a number of prominent educators. Among them were Dr. J. P. McConnell, of Emory and Henry College; Prof. Defrenee, of Damascus; Superintendent W. J. Edmondson, of Washington county; Principal F. B. Fitzpatrick, of Roanoke; Principal Wassum, of Pearisburg; Professor Keagley, of Wytheville, and the Hon. H. C. Gilmer, of Pulaski.

Dr. J. P. McConnell, Prof. Defrenee and the Hon. H. C. Gilmer acted as judges for the various contests. Prof. W. R. Bowers, of the Rural Retreat High School, as local manager for the occasion, deserves much credit for the success of the meeting and the warm reception of the delegates. Examiner E. E. Worrell, chairman of the executive committee of the association, presided at the sessions Thursday, and Professor Fitzpatrick was chairman Friday night and Saturday morning.

The delegates of Roanoke speak highly of their royal entertainment. The hospitable homes of Rural Retreat were wide open and the representatives were cordially received

McChesney Gets

Bristol, Va., June 20.—The school board of Bristol, Va., elected twenty of the twenty-six teachers for the public schools at a meeting last Saturday night. It is said that a majority of the board agreed upon a basis of compromise with Superintendent McChesney, where by the superintendent will receive his salary of \$1,400 per annum, which has been withheld from him for nearly two years because a majority of the board was opposed to him. A bitter fight has been waged upon the superintendent, who holds his position by reason of the fact that he was elected by the State Board, which board pays him a salary of \$200 per annum, the understanding being that the city board would supplement this amount. For the most part the teachers elected are the same as served last year.

That there has been considerable delay in beginning work on the new building for Marion College is due to circumstances beyond the control of the Board of Trustees and the Building Committee. But the work has now been begun in earnest. The old building have been torn down, the rubbish removed and the excavations for the basement and foundations are being made. The whole building is to be finished as soon as possible, but owing to the shortness of time between now and October 1st, the date set for the opening of the new session, the completion of only such parts as are actually needed for the school at that time.

That Marion may continue on her mission of good for this section of the country; that she may have an equipment enabling her to measure up to the high standard set for her in the future; that she may enter upon this larger life with all confidence, and even with joy, we would call upon all friends of the cause to raise up in this hour of need and give her the support that she merits and has a right to expect.
