Walton, of Woodstock in which he says: "As I have construed the ballot law for county elections the ballots must be prepared and distributed by the electoral board should contain the names of the candidates for county and district officers, the latter so ordered and arranged that these can be voted for only by the qualified voters of the district they will serve. For 'District A' the ticket will contain the names of the candidates for magistrate, supervisors, etc., in this district and so for the other districts of the county. As to county officers the ticket will be the same, and change as to the names of candidates for district officers with the district."

MR. F. D. TOE:—The financial question is coming rapidly to the front, and will be in 1896 the only issue before the people. President Cleveland has thrown down the gauntlet and declared war on silver. This is satisfactory to all parties, for the reason, that we now know exactly where the present administration stands on a vital question.
The great question that confronts the mass of the American people to-day and will for several years, is: Shall our government follow a line of financial policy which gives to the people a contracted currency, or shall it follow a policy which will give to the people a sufficiently full and flexible currency adequate for the growing business and population of the country? In other words, there are two parties in this Nation at issue on the monetary system of the country. One party contends that we have already a sufficiency of currency and who say that gold is the only safe basis for our currency. The other party contends that we have not a sufficiency of currency and that gold is not the only safe basis for a sound and stable currency.

This important question threatens to disrupt the Republican party. It has already thrown the Democratic party into confusion and its early disintegration is imminent. Chaos seems to rule supreme in the councils of that party and its destiny seems to be taking it to utter annihilation. This question is dividing the Republican party into two factions, and where it will end cannot be clearly seen by man. The signs seem to point to the coalition of two forces hitherto hostile, under one common leader.

One wing of Democracy under Cleveland will unite with a wing of the Republicans and make a fight for what they term sound money.

Another party composed of both Democrats, Republicans and Populists will combine and wage a battle for an increase of the volume of the circulating medium, and its complete control by the national government.

This is, as I look at it, the question and this is the situation. In these series of articles on this question I shall endeavor to present the arguments pro and con, and will try to state them impartially and clearly, so that your readers may see "so far as I am able to help them" both sides of this question which bids fair to bring about a complete re-orientation of our financial system.

In the first place I will make my own position clear to all. I am in favor of an increase in the volume of the currency. I favor the entire abolition of the National Banking system, I favor the complete control of our financial system, by the National government, I favor a system of postal savings banks controlled by the National government. I favor rigid economy in government and Jeffersonian simplicity.

This may sound egotistical to some, but I believe every citizen should have clear cut ideas on questions of public policy and fearlessly express them. No man should be a blind, bigoted partisan, for the term is synonymous with blinded, bigoted fool. A man should ally himself with a party because that party advocates the lines of policy he thinks best for his country.

No man should be a protectionist because the Republican party advocates that policy. But he should be a protectionist because he thinks that policy is best. No man should be a Democrat because his father voted that party ticket. But he should be a Democrat because he thinks the policy advocated by that party is best.

If the Democratic party advocated protection to home industries I would support that party. If the Republican party advocated free trade I would not support it. If the Populist party advocates an increase of the currency and the Republican party does not, or straddles the question, then I support the Populist party.

Having, I hope, clearly defined my position on this question, I will proceed in my next article to discuss this vital question in detail. And if

Fifteen Thousand Miners Drop Their Picks.
Pocahontas, Va., April 30.—The strike which has for several weeks been expected on the Flat Top coal region, culminated today when fifteen thousand men employed along the Ohio extension of the Norfolk and Western railway walked out, the immediate cause being the posting of notices by thirty operators of a twenty per cent. reduction in the wages of the men.
There are only 1,800 to 2,000 men at work in the entire field, these being at the Southwest Virginia Improvement Co. and the Browning mines of Pocahontas. The Southwest Company increased its employ today by the addition of 200 men. There is little doubt that there will be an effort in the next two or three days to force these men out. Should such be the case serious rioting is anticipated and it is the avowed purpose of the operators and mine here to resist any such effort to utmost.
It is stated on good authority that the operators of the Elk Horn region are secretly in sympathy with the strikers, hoping thereby to compel the Norfolk and Western railroad to distribute cars on a different basis from the present arrangement, their claim being that the company have heretofore shown favoritism in the matter.

The United Mine Workers of America have good locals at nearly all of the operations and will have the management of the striking men who demand higher wages, in the rules as to docking and weighing.
Up to this time there has been no indication of rioting and everything is unusually quiet. The Norfolk and Western Railroad Company have a heavy guard at all its bridges, trestles and tunnels and will use every endeavor to prevent injury to its property.
