

Weaver Rotten Egged.

HIS PROJECTED CAMPAIGN IN GEORGIA ABANDONED IN DISGUST.

His Disgraceful Treatment Was Caused by His Refusal to Divide Time with the Democrats.

ATLANTA, Sept. 24.—Gen. Jno. B. Weaver, Third party candidate for the Presidency, brought his Georgia campaign to an end to-day by cancelling all his dates. He does this on the ground that there is no free speech in the South. He was assured that he would have a fair hearing here, and the 5,000 men gathered at the capital to-night passed resolutions inviting Weaver to speak.

Last night's experience in Macon satisfied him, and he not only refused to speak here, but cancelled all his dates elsewhere.

Mrs. Lease spoke strongly about the Macon meeting. "No, I did not speak at Macon," said she, "although I went there with the intention of so doing. After supper at the Lanier House Gen. Weaver went upon the front porch, Mrs. Weaver and myself following him. In front of us was a howling mob of several thousand people. Mrs. Weaver stepped behind a table upon which were three lamps burning brightly. Hardly had she seated herself before she was struck squarely in the face with a rotten egg, the egg breaking and splashing over her dress. At least a dozen other eggs were thrown.

All during this time the General was cool and collected, although the crowd continued to throw eggs, striking persons who were not with our party. Gen. Weaver attempted to speak three times, but each time was silenced.

"It was not the boys of Macon and the hoodlums who attempted to break up the speaking, but some of that town's most prominent citizens were on hand. The people of Macon will receive retribution for egging Mrs. Weaver, who is a pure, christian woman and president of the State W. C. T. U. of Iowa."

One of the strongest incentives to this unfair treatment of Gen. Weaver was the refusal of the People's Party State Executive Committee to permit joint debates. The Democratic Committee asked that Gen. Weaver divide time at his appointments with Democratic orators.

The reply was that Gen. Weaver would be happy to meet Grover Cleveland on the stump, but that it would be below the dignity of a Presidential candidate to appear in the hustings with a man who was not his political equal.

A CHILD WITH HORNS.

Curious Freak of Nature in a Little Village Down in Texas.

BONHAM, Tex., Sept. 21.—The wife of a farmer named Robertson, living just out of town, gave birth a day or two ago to a child, presenting the curious deformity of a pair of horns growing on its head. The horns are nearly three inches long, and grow just above the ears, projecting up, though close to the skull, and curving slightly at the ends. They seem to be of a greatly nature rather than hard, like horn, but the doctors declare that they are gradually growing firm and will probably become true horns.

They are evidently a part of the bone of the head, and the physicians consider the operation of removing them would in all likelihood endanger the child's life, and certainly lay bare that portion of the brain lying beneath the excrescence. So the parents have decided to postpone at any rate the removal of the deformity. The mother attributes the growth to her having been gored by a bull about three months ago. The child is a fine little boy, seeming quite intelligent and well made, with the exception of its singular head ornament.

Norfolk and Western Ohio Extension.

The last rail on the Ohio extension of the Norfolk and Western Railroad was laid on September 22. This line runs through the State of West Virginia, and connects the main line of the Norfolk and Western Railroad with its Scioto Valley division, extending from the Pocahontas coal fields to the Ohio river. The company has been constructing this line for some time past, laying track from station to station, and the forces joined at eighty-one miles from the Kenova, on the Ohio river. At the latter point the line crosses the Ohio river bridge, completed and opened for traffic by the Norfolk and Western Railroad Company in November, 1891. The company now has a direct through line from Norfolk, Va., to Columbus, Ohio, a distance of 707 miles. This line opens up the port of Norfolk and Southwest Virginia to the Northwest, and will be the means of bringing shipments of grain, provisions and general merchandise from the North and West to the port of Norfolk, the distance by this line from Norfolk to Chicago being 1,020 miles. This line will also place the Pocahontas coal fields and the new Kenova coal fields in connection with the North and West, for coal and coke.

All Night in a Cave.

Sallie Kimiter Moss, of Atlanta, Ga., and a young woman companion, while taking a midday stroll at Tallula Falls, in that State, decided to explore Grand Cavern. Down the winding descent they clambered until they could go no further. Then, turning to retrace their steps, they were horrified to find that they were unable to ascend the steep cliffs they had passed down.

Effort after effort failed, and when over come with exhaustion they sat down in the cavern to wait to be discovered. At home the parents and friends of fair prisoners became alarmed when night fell, and, supposing that the girls had become imprisoned in the hills, relief parties were organized. All night they searched in vain.

About 10 o'clock the prisoners saw the lanterns of the searching parties, but could not shout loud enough to attract their attention and remained prisoners in plain view of their friends. About 10 o'clock in the morning Will Moses heard their cries and discovered their location, but found he could not reach them; ropes were spliced together till long enough to reach the bottom of the cavern. The young woman tied the rope around their waists and were drawn out.

In 1860 the farms of the United States were valued at \$9,854,000,000, now they are worth \$200,958,000,000; in 1860 the live stock was valued at \$256,000,000 now it is worth \$550,000,000; in 1860 the farmers owned household furniture to the amount of \$1,089,000,000, now they own \$2,418,000,000 worth; in 1860 the farm implements in use aggregated \$6,615,000,000, now the total is \$13,110,000,000. The farmers have not grown poorer and poorer under protection, as the free traders claim.

Virginia News.

Items of Interest Gathered from Our Latest Exchanges and Boiled Down.

There are four murderers now confined in the jail of Carroll county. Robert L. Tilley, who murdered Lou Haynes four years ago, John Weatherman, who murdered his wife, J. C. Helmstutter, for the murder of E. M. Beville and David Rigney, who split his wife's head open with an axe last week.

The great job of arching the Flat Top tunnel, between Mill Creek and Elkhorn, has been completed. This work has been on hand about two years and required millions of brick to cover the 3,000 lined feet arched. This was regarded by many as one of the most dangerous tunnels on the road. It is entirely safe now.

Floyd Osborne and John Griffith, charged with the murder of John Blovin in Scott county, will be tried at Wise C. H. this week, a change of venue having been granted.

Governor McKinney has received a communication from Mr. W. G. Whidby, notifying him that the Southern inter-State road congress will meet in Memphis, Tenn., on the third Wednesday in October, and that the State of Virginia is entitled to two representatives from each Congressional district. The governor is requested to make the appointments at an early date. A full representation is desired for the reason that a national congress is to be organized at that meeting.

The Holston Valley Railroad Co. has been organized in Bristol with H. W. M. Dyer, of Detroit, President; A. F. Wiley, of Bristol, general manager, and Robt. Wiley, of Bristol, Sec. The road is to run from Bluff City to Damascus, a distance of more than 25 miles.

Kidnapped.

RURAL RETREAT, Va., Sept. 19.—A colored girl named Mary Green who has been living for some time with Mr. James Snavely, yesterday evening about dark noticed a little orphan girl away from home. Before leaving she poisoned a cup of coffee. Mr. Snavely drank the coffee which caused a death-like sickness, followed by vomiting. The guilty one has not been apprehended.

PARK AGNEW FOR CONGRESS.

Nominated by Acclamation by the Eighth Virginia District Republicans.

MANASSAS, Va., Sept. 20.—The Republicans of the 8th Congressional District held their convention to-day. Hon. Park Agnew, of Alexandria, was nominated for Congress by acclamation.

The committee on resolutions presented the following, which was adopted: That we earnestly endorse the administration of President Harrison, and appeal to the Republicans of the 8th district of Virginia to organize and work unceasingly to secure his re-election.

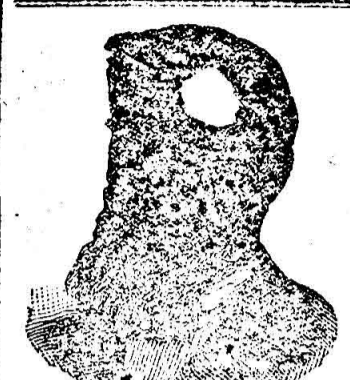

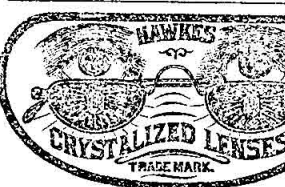
