

## Sunday School Entertainment

## Why Smyth County Is First

A VERY NOTABLE ADDRESS BEFORE THE KIWANIS CLUB

The meeting of the Kiwanis Club on Tuesday night was the occasion of one of the most notable addresses on the advantages and opportunities of Southwest Virginia, that we have heard for a long time. Mrs. B. E. Copenhaver was the guest of the Club, and made the address for the evening, her subject being "Southwest Virginia," taken in connection with the effort that is now being made by the Towns and counties of the Southwest towards advertising and developing. Mrs. Copenhaver is a very ready and pleasant speaker, with a fluent command of choice English that readily and appropriately conveys the ideas of the speaker. Her subject was one that she was unhesitatingly drawn from. She was particularly strong when speaking of the great productiveness of the country, and what one would find in the home of any of our progressive farmers. What could be asked for in a country that the great Southwest did not offer? It had the people, derived from a long ancestry of Scotch-Irish that had planted the wilderness and made it blossom and grow; it had health that had no peer from coast to coast; it had facilities for material development in manufacturing and industrial lines that could not be surpassed; and the one thing that was now needed to make this section without an equal in the nation, was for its people to make use of the great natural opportunities at their command. Mrs. Copenhaver's address was enthusiastically received by the members of the Club, who extended to her many congratulations.

The meeting was held in the dining room of the Royal Oak Presbyterian church, and the guests for the occasion were Mr. Carter, of the staff of the Richmond News-Leader; Mr. Dan Hubbard, of Lexington, Ky.; and Mr. Bertie Ellis of Marion.

A letter was read from a Chicago concern asking for information as to what Marion would offer for the location here a manufacturing plant that would give employment to about 500 women and girls; it was said that a free site would be given, and the matter was referred to a committee to find out just what was wanted to interest the plant in Marion.

## Organize Southwest Virginia, Inc.

Eighteen Counties Join In The Grand Movement. Dr. McConnell Made President--Wytheville Headquarters For First Year--C. Brown Cox and Charles C. Lincoln, Jr., Directors For Smyth County. Another Meeting in Marion April 4th.

One thousand persons, including delegates, from 10 counties and four cities met Saturday and organized the Southwest Virginia, Inc., with the object of promoting Southwest Virginia, developing roads, hydro-electric power and attracting tourists to the natural scenic beauty of this section. The organization purposes to begin a full time secretary and employ operations in the next 90 days.

The constitution and by-laws submitted by a committee was approved by delegates, and one of the delegates was directed to draw up the proposed corporation charter which will be considered at a meeting in Marion that may be held Saturday. Wytheville was selected as the headquarters for the organization for the first year.

Officers Named.

Eighteen counties are to participate in the organization. Directors from ten counties and four cities were elected yesterday. John P. McConnell, of Radford, president of Radford College, was elected president of the corporation. Other officers chosen are: Lee Long, of Dante, first vice-president; H. L. Bonham, of Chilhowie, second vice-president, and City Manager Ridley, of Bluefield, W. Va., third vice-president. Col. K. E. Harmon was elected temporary treasurer and Tom Wallner, of Pulaski temporary secretary.

Counties invited to participate in the organization are: Carroll, Roanoke, Montgomery, Floyd, Craig, Pulaski, Giles, Bland, Grayson, Tazewell, Smyth, Buchanan, Russell, Washington, Dickinson, Wise, Scott and Lee. Cities that had representatives, Bristol, Va.-Tenn.; Radford and Bluefield, Va.-W. Va.

The Marion Kiwanis Club of Smyth County had more than 100 delegates present and Wythe County had 75 present.

Elect Directors.

Directors elected were: Carroll County—W. Reeves Gardner and Mrs. Belva Goad, of Hills; Giles County—Judge Mason, of Pearisburg, and K. H. Farrier, Wythe County—George A. Lambert, of Retreat, and D. E. Zimmerman, of Wytheville, Bland County—H. K. ...

Objects and purposes of the organization were outlined as follows:

"To increase the residential population of the entire area of this section and take care of tourists and make arrangements for proper accommodations for them; development of each area in each county in a manner that is best suitable for the particular county; better railroad facilities and transportation development; development of hydro-electric power throughout the area and development of industries; proper publicity for scenic, historical and natural attractions; development of good roads throughout Southwest Virginia; and, finally for welding together the Southwest Virginia counties into an organization that will function and let the world know what Southwest Virginia has to offer."

B. F. Moomaw, secretary of the Roanoke Chamber of Commerce, representative Roanoke City and County. He declared that Roanoke was in hearty accord with the organization.

Predict Success.

Other delegates left here predicting immediate success for the new organization. J. P. McAllister, of Hot Springs, and a director of the Shenandoah Valley, Inc., spoke and gave a line on the work there and in California. He was well received in an interview in Roanoke during the night he declared he had never seen any more enthusiasm anywhere in the founding of a new organization. Officers selected were regarded as some of Southwest Virginia's most progressive citizens. He felt that this careful beginning would assure the organization genuine success.

When delegates reached Pulaski today they found the court house too small to take care of the mass meeting, and so delegates met at the Dalton Theatre.

Started by Rotary Club.

The organization was begun five weeks ago by the Pulaski Rotary Club, which saw need for it. Preliminary plans were worked out and a mass meeting called.

The meeting today began business by electing George A. Lambert, of Wythe County, chairman. A roll call of counties was then made, and a tentative constitution and by-laws presented by John S. Draper, of Pulaski. It was then decided to incorporate and the constitution and by-laws were adopted. Mr. Draper was named to draw up the proposed charter.

## Spelling Contest

ANNUAL COUNTY CONTEST

The Annual Spelling and Declamation contest for the public schools of Smyth County will be held in the auditorium of the Court House, in Marion, Saturday, March 27th. The spelling contest will be held in the afternoon at 2 P. M., with representatives from the schools of the town and in the county. At night promptly at seven-thirty, the Declamation Contest, one for the boys and one for the girls, will be held in the same building. These contestants are entered from schools having a high school department. It has been decided to award a first and second prize for each of these events.

In addition to the training given to the pupil another great benefit is being derived. A small admission fee of ten cents is charged in the afternoon and the same fee at night. This fee pays the expenses incurred, and any money remaining is turned over to a library fund from which the schools may derive a benefit.

## Another Old Veteran Passes Away.

On the 14th inst Gibson-McCreedy Camp of Confederate Veterans held a meeting to appoint delegates to the Grand Camp, which will meet at Dallas, Texas in May. There were but ten veterans at the meeting of the local camp on the 14th inst. Among this small number was W. A. Williams. A few days later he was stricken with paralysis; and he died at his home in Marion on the 18th inst.

Early in the Civil War, comrade Williams, who had been trained in the business, was detailed to assist in making iron at the furnace on forge of John Barton, which was located in Rye Valley, Smyth County. The products of this furnace was of superior quality, and was used for making cannon and shells for the Confederate Government. In this valuable service, comrade Williams was constantly and efficiently engaged until the close of the war.

Comrade Williams was born in Rye Valley, Smyth County, Virginia, in November, 1842. The place of his nativity was at a point near where Monroe Pugh now lives. He was the son of Rufus K. Williams and the great-grandson of Tommie Thomas; and was therefore, a descendant of the excellent pioneer settlers on the South Fork of Holston River, in the present Smyth County. For many years he had been a consistent member of the Baptist Church. He was a good man and a good citizen, and will be greatly missed by his comrades of Gibson-McCreedy Camp. It will not be long until his few remaining comrades will join him in the great beyond, and share with him the delights of eternal life.

He comes with enviable recommendations as a christian gentleman. He possesses, a winsome personality, and a voice of unusual sweetness and power. He is a fine leader and has a good selection of solos. In a letter his pastor says of him: "John is an exceptionally fine fellow, sweet spirited, high toned christian gentleman. He is a faithful servant of the Lord, a tither and in every respect a whole souled servant. He has splendid gifts as an evangelistic singer, a fine voice. He will do you much good. He has the heartiest endorsement of our entire church. And I commend him to you most cordially." The church has 1,700 members.

Under Mr. Anderson leadership the singing during the Revival will be an attractive feature. He will be aided by the church choir, a large young people's chorus and a responsive congregation. A new song book will be in use at the services.

The pastor will preach at all the services during the Revival which will last two weeks and longer if the interest demands it. His sermons will be Great Bible Messages in a new setting to meet present day moral and spiritual needs. Services everyday at 7:30 P. M. except Saturday. Morning the schools will be visited; prayer meetings will be held in the homes and at the noon hour meetings on the streets and in the shops.





Interstate Highways, Good Roads and Hotel Accommodations Will Forge State Head.
