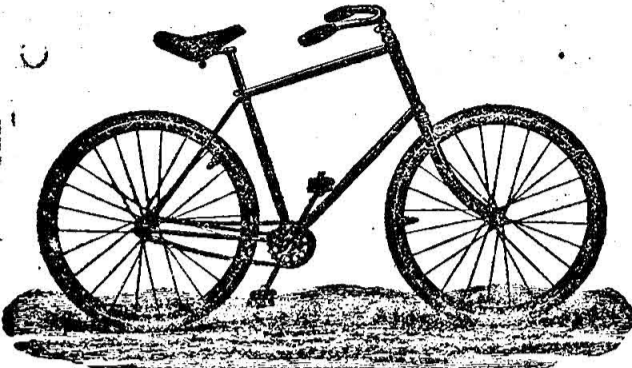

A VIRGINIA GHOST STORY.

WORSHIPPERS IN A COLORED CONGREGATION RECEIVE A SHOCK.

The congregation of a Methodist church is much exercised at present over a ghost which is said to have made its appearance in their midst on a recent occasion. One of the deacons of the church a few months ago lost his wife, who had greatly shocked the religionists by her refusal to become one of them. A Sunday or two ago, at night service, the deacon entered the church after the congregation had assembled, and, in full view of the people, there walked behind him a woman bearing a striking resemblance to his dead wife. The spectators held their breath, watching the gliding figure behind the man, who seemed entirely unconscious of it. He entered his few with the woman still behind, seating herself when he did, but presently the stranger was seen to have disappeared, though no one had seen her leave the church by the one door, and the windows were open top and bottom such short distances as to make it impossible for a grown person to have gone out at them, even if this feat could have been accomplished without any one seeing it.

After the service was over all waited to see the deacon leave the church and when he walked away the same woman was discovered walking behind him. The man looked back at the curious crowd, but did not seem to see his companion, and when the minister, summoning up his courage, ventured to join him, the figure disappeared.

That night the groans of the deacon roused the other inmates of the house, and going to him he was found to be dying. All were positive that he was alone when they entered the room, which was confirmed by the doctor who was called to attend him, but that as the breath left his body the woman who had walked behind him was seen to leave the room. This is also confirmed by the doctor, who declares himself at a loss to know where she could have come from.

He noticed as she passed him that her garments exhaled a peculiar odor of corruption, and that her face was tied about the jaws after the fashion of arraying the dead. The sister of the deacon, who was sitting next the deacon as he died, and seeing her deceased relative, started up and would have assisted her, but the phantom turned its face to her and went out with a wave of the hand.

A FASHIONABLE WEDDING.

Country-house weddings are en vogue this autumn among the "smart" set, and they certainly are jollier and afford opportunity for more natural picture-que effects than the fashionable wedding in town. WHISKERS IN CONGRESS.

FEW FACES LIKE CLAY'S AND WEBSTER'S AMONG OUR STATESMEN.

There has of late years been a change in Senatorial physiognomy. There are now but few faces among our Statesmen like those of Webster, Clay and Calhoun, which were shaved every morning and upon which whiskers would have been deemed, a disgrace.

There are as many different styles of beard and hair in Congress to day as there are members, and in most cases baldness of cheeks and chin has been changed for baldness of crown. Half the public men of our time are bald. President Cleveland's hair is fast passing away. Adlai E. Stevenson's is thin at the crown, and it would take twenty silver dollars to cover the bald spot on Joe Hawley's handsome white head. Joe Blackburn is fast growing bald, though his rosy cheeks show that his blood contains plenty of iron. Isham G. Harris of Tennessee has enough white skin on the top of his head to make a cover for a boy's new drum, and I note that Senator Butler of South Carolina combs his hairs to the front. David B. Hill has a white streak of baldness running from his deep set eyes to the back of his head. Above the ears there are wisps of black hair closely cut and these wisps run into short brown side whiskers. Hill's face is a sallow one. His eyebrows are not strongly marked, but his fierce eyes look out at you from under the snowy river of baldness which flows above them to the back of his head.

But whiskers and not hair now form the true sign of greatness. Take Peffer of Kansas—you could put his little hickory nut head in a two quart bucket, and if it laid on its back the nose would not stick up above the edges. The beard, however, would flow out to a length of three feet, and this beard of Peffer's gives a sort of dignity to his features Peffer is tall and thin. He is 6 feet in height and about 18 inches across the shoulders. As he stands up in the Senate his beard reaches to his waist, and he appears to be the typical product of the dyspeptic low lands of the Missouri. Seated in his chair his beard flows over his narrow chest and its bottom ends kiss the lowest buttons of his vest. He speaks he points his periods by running his hands up and down it. Does he dye it? I am told he does not, but those whiskers have a tawny dead look which is often associated with the hair restorer, and they are as wavy and curly as though they were kept in curl paper over night. They are by all odds the longest whiskers in the Senate, and are only exceeded in length by the speeches of Senator Stewart of Nevada, who sits just behind.

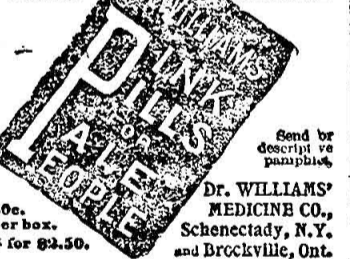

The Republicans won a great victory in the Municipal election, in Indianapolis, Ind., on 9th inst. electing their ticket by over 3000 majority. The democratic majority at the last election was nearly 2,800.

[Continued from last week]

The reason why the materials of which our currency is made should be of such a nature that one will not appreciate in the value over another or depreciate under another is to avoid one of the most serious difficulties now confronting the whole financial world. Gold, that metal, which has been conferred but few if any blessings on mankind, and which has always been a prolific source of misery, crime and woe, has appreciated in purchasing power to such a degree that we see silver debased by it; or by the manipulators of what is known as the gold idea or single standard, of value ideas as they term it. They, the single standard advocates, would convince us that if gold was universally adopted by all the governments of the earth as the basis of all money, we would have an absolute standard and criterion of value. If they would only in their selfish greed or mistaken ideas stop and reason, they would see clearly that an absolute criterion of value is as impossible for men to establish as it is to establish a criterion of truth. The only thing that can be done by man in the case is to provide through the properly constituted agency or government a necessary and sufficient medium of exchange, based not on one metal or another metal, on one material or another material, but based on the honesty, stability, wealth, revenues and expenditures of that government and people. To provide against the control of that medium, by any individual profit, and a consequent loss of the people. All banks of issue should be abolished.

The creation of a medium of exchange is a monopoly of the people's government, and all profits resulting from that monopoly should revert back to the people, whether those profits result from coinage of metals or the emission of notes, or the lending of money to the people. There are various channels through which our government could legitimately increase the amount of the currency. The railroads, those high ways of commerce and arteries of trade and travel, which have become as necessary to our mode of life as the seas, the rivers, streets and roads are a constant and increasing source of annoyance, injustice and extortion to one class of our citizens, for the profit and aggrandizement of another. The various States fail to correct the and greed of the railroad monopolies. Often, because the roads can buy whole legislatures, both courts of justice, and corruptly influence voters. This nation should own and control those highways for the benefit of the whole people. Through that means a vast outlet would be given to the circulation of a medium of exchange. If this nation decides that gold shall be the basis of its circulating medium, then the government should at once exercise the right of eminent domain and acquire and hold all mines or sources of gold and silver, and work the same for the benefit of the whole people. The supply of silver, if it is so enormous, as stated by one faction in the present contest, could be controlled so far as the people are concerned by this means.

Now, brother farmers, and fellow citizens, let me urge you to examine this question as carefully and as wisely as God has given you knowledge and wisdom to do. Our monetary system has, through the greed and avarice of selfish, designing, un-patriotic men, reached a point or condition where something has got to be done. Let us rise above the fifth and shame and cowardice of dead and rotten partyism, and in the election before us vote for the right as we conscientiously see the right. Striving by our ballots to shape and establish a financial policy that, while doing full justice to the creditor class of our citizens, will do no injustice to the debtor class—a policy that will with the indomitable energy of this people soon fill this broad land with peace, prosperity and contentment—a policy of which it can be said in after years that fifty men of the Jay Gould class do not, cannot, and will never control the finances of this country for their own greed and selfish ends.

Remember, that eternal vigilance is the price of liberty.

\$1,000 Damages.

The argument in the case of Dr. J. M. Bailey vs. J. C. Haskell, on a charge of criminal libel, was concluded Thursday morning, and the jury arrived at a verdict in the afternoon. According to the verdict Dr. Bailey recovers damages from Col. Haskell to the amount of \$1,000 and the cost of the suit. The cost will amount to considerable, probably \$700. The amount sued for was \$50,000.

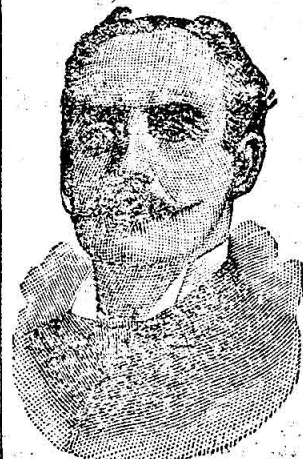

Carrico Not Guilty.

J. H. Carrico, the deputy U. S. marshal who killed Jas. Nelson in this county in December, 1891, was tried in the circuit court of the U. S. at Abingdon on last Tuesday, and a verdict of not guilty was rendered by the jury. Our Commonwealth's Attorney Mr. A. M. Dickenson has ably prosecuted this case in both State and Federal courts, assisted by State's Attorney General Scott, while the accused has been represented by the Attorneys for the U. S., and Hon.
