## Alumnae Holds Meeting.

On Monday, May 31st, the Alumnae of Marion College held its annual meeting in the College, with Mrs. W. R. Brown, President, presiding. The Alumnae were gratified to know that the one-thousand dollar goal set for 1920 was reached on the day of the meeting. Since 1917 the Alumnae have raised \$3000. Two thousand dollars of this sum is divided into two scholarships of one thousand dollars each, the interest on which is to assist worthy girls in getting an education at Marion College, perpetually. These scholarships are known as the Alumnae Scholarship Funds.
