Efforts to Consolidate Baptists Inaugurated.

Philadelphia, June 26.—Efforts to consolidate the Free Will Baptists and the Southern Baptists with the Northern Baptists were begun at the convention of the latter here recently. A committee was appointed to negotiate with a committee representing the 87,000 communicants of the Free Will branch at Old Orchard, Maine, July 11th. These branches split in the year 1800 over the "open communion." Another committee was named to meet a commission of the Southern Baptist convention and try to unite the two organizations, which split in the early sixties. The time and place of the latter meeting will be decided later.

July the Fourth.

The 4th day of July has had a significant place in the history of all ages and nations—more so, probably, than any other date in the calendar. It has witnessed the birth of new nations, grand scientific discoveries and the evolution of new principles, and it has also seen the fall of proud monarchies and the death of ancient institutions, customs and laws. It was on this day that the cross triumphed over the crescent, that Christianity vanquished infidelity, and right and justice achieved a signal victory when King John of England was compelled by his barons to sign the Magna Charta. But the crowning achievement of this day of days was reserved for this hemisphere when on July 4, 1776, the trumpet blast proclaiming liberty and equality to all men was sent echoing throughout the world.

On the immortal 4th of the year 1776 the Declaration of Independence was adopted by the Continental congress. It was thirty-nine times before that body until it was finally adopted. Entire separation from England was not at first thought of by the colonies. New England wished it, but the Southern States were against it.

The seat of war, having in 1776 been changed from the North to the South, caused the South also to change her views. The North Carolina convention took the first step toward independence by a resolution to concur with those in the other colonies in declaring independence. This occurred on April 22, 1776.

Virginia on May 17, 1776, prepared the title of the document by directing her representative to propose in congress a Declaration of Independence. Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Roger Sherman and Robert C. Livingston were the committee appointed to draft the Declaration. The draft was formulated almost entirely by Jefferson. Before July 1st Pennsylvania, Maryland and New Jersey had instructed their delegates to vote against the Declaration. These instructions were rescinded. South Carolina came over to the majority. Delaware's vote, at first divided, was cast in the affirmative. The Declaration was therefore adopted by the unanimous vote of twelve States—New York alone not voting, on July 4, 1776. The New York convention afterward ratified the Declaration, and the engrossed copy was signed on August 2d. The Declaration sets forth the rights of man, and the colonies enumerate their grievances against the British government and declare "that these united colonies are and of right ought to be free and independent States."

On July 4, 1845, Texas was annexed to the United States by a convention of the citizens ratifying the action of the United States Senate. In 1848, on July 4th, a treaty of peace with Mexico was proclaimed at Washington. On the same day, in the same year, the ceremony of the laying of the corner-stone of the Washington monument at Washington took place. The ceremony was performed by President Polk.

Only July 4, 1863, Vicksburg surrendered to General Grant. Five years thereafter, on the same day, the Burlingame treaty with China was signed at Washington, and on the same day the President of the United States issued an amnesty proclamation pardoning all rebels not under presentment or indictment in United States courts.

On July 4, 1884, a monument to Francis Scott Key was unveiled in Golden Gate Park, San Francisco.

The above are only a few of the more significant achievements of the "glorious 4th," the results of which are being felt with increased force in all parts of the world as the years roll by and the love of liberty becomes stronger and stronger.—National Press.

The State Summer Normal opens here on Tuesday, the 27th, and many teachers are expected to attend, preparatory to standing examinations as teachers in the Public Schools of Virginia this fall. Prof. J. R. Hunter is local manager, and Prof. S. R. McChesney, of Bristol, will have general charge.

Everything is "peace and quiet" on the college campus now. Most of the boys are at home on their summer vacation. However, the stillness will not be for long. Early next week the campus will be crowded with pretty country school marmas—with just a springs of male pedagogue, and all will be bustle for another six weeks. All Nations at the King's Coronation.

President Taft to King George: "On this auspicious occasion I take sincere pleasure in extending to Your Majesty cordial felicitations in the name of the people of the United States and in my own, and in expressing the cherished hope that under your guiding influence the British dominion may flourish and prosper.

"I assure Your Majesty of my best wishes for your personal welfare and that of Your Majesty's family and for the continuance of the friendly relations existing between Great Britain and the United States."

INCIDENTS AND ACCIDENTS.
Between 7,000 and 8,000 distinguished persons witnessed the medieval ceremony in the abbey.

The heirs to most of the thrones in Europe occupied places of honor and over forty members of Royal families, 250 Rulers of foreign states, 1,450 Earls, Dukes, Lords and Ladies; 300 Ambassadors and Ministers, and 1,500 representatives of the army, navy, judiciary and clergy were in the notable assemblage.

J. Pierpont Morgan, the American millionaire banker, and Charles P. Taft, a brother of President Taft, wore court uniforms of black velvet, knee breeches and silver buttons, and carried swords.

General Kitchener was in command of the 60,000 troops and 12,000 policemen were on duty.

There were three processions from the Palace to the Abbey, the Royal guests, the Prince of Wales and members of the Royal family, and the imperial procession.

A man was blown to pieces by the bursting of a cannon at Lynne-Regis.

At Barnstable an arch collapsed, a woman was killed and a number of persons injured.

In the Royal procession an Indian officer was thrown from his horse and trampled.

If You Have No Ice.

The July Woman's Home Companion contains a great variety of practical housekeeper who gets along without ice:

"Obtain a large, common flower-pot and seal the hole in the bottom with plaster of Paris. Place in the pot the bottle containing milk, or a covered crock containing butter, and fill the pot with water to as great a depth as possible without the bottle or crock floating. Cover the pot with a board or a plate and set out in the open air, away from the direct sunlight, and preferably where there is a current of air. The evaporation of the water from the surface of the porous pot will keep the contents several degrees colder than the outside air, when there is the slightest amount of air stirring. The bigger the wind, or the drier the air, the greater will be the cooling effect."

Some months ago a number of the women of our town organized themselves into a club, the object of which is the improvement of the High School premises, the purchase of a library for the High School and the encouragement of efforts looking to the beautifying and improvement of the town. We are told that beauty is an asset, and as all owners of property strive as far as their means will allow to surround themselves with attractive objects that they and their children may benefit by their uplifting and refining effects. So the citizens of a town should appreciate at their full value beautiful buildings, shade trees, cleanly streets and well-paved walks. Surely every citizen of Marion has been struck by the comments on the public buildings, recently erected, made by those who have been absent from the town for some years.

Costly buildings alone do not make a beautiful city, however, civic pride should cause us to be eager to preserve every natural beauty, as well as glad to greet each new building which will add to the size and impressiveness of the town. Many towns less favored by nature than our own are much more attractive in appearance than Marion, because their streets are not littered with dirt, papers, tin cans and refuse from grocery stores; weeds have not been allowed to take possession of the sides of their streets, and they have not only preserved what they had of turf, shrubs and trees, but have added to these too little appreciated assets of a town.

If we take pride in the city of the living, quite as much should we care for and decorate the city of the dead. Our cemetery has a magnificent situation and wonderful natural beauty. We have heard of a gentleman's saying that if he should die in South west Virginia he would prefer to be buried in the Marion cemetery rather than in the one belonging to the town where he resides, because of the quiet restfulness and beauty of our burial place. Nothing can more beautify a burial place than growing flowers, shrubs and trees—especially trees. Flowers and shrubs, unless constantly tended, become ragged and unkempt, and are at best short lived. Trees need little tending; pruning by spring, unnoted and un-

What Every Woman Should Know.

William Allen White believes that every woman, rich or poor, ought to know how to cook, even if she has to go without the higher branches of education. Listen to this editorial:

One of the important things reformers overlook in re-making the world is the need of cooks—good, plain, every-day cooks who can cook steak without curling it, boil water without burning it and peel potatoes without gouging them. Food enough is wasted in cooking to feed one-fourth more people than eat it. A large per cent. of every man's wages goes into the slop bucket, and the poorer the man, generally, the larger the per cent. wasted.

Women who can fix over "come backs" are more important to the salvation of the world than women who can paint china or do drawn-work. The need of bush and bread pantries is a crying one in this Vale of Tears. The need of women who know how to fix good things out of scraps, who put up fruit and don't live out of cans, is as urgent as any other reform now before the country. The woman with a large pile of tin cans in her alley is a menace.

The same conditions exist, more or less strenuously in every corner of America, and nothing in the way of scholarship is so sorely needed today as knowing how to prepare plain, every-day food palatably, economically and wholesomely. Every woman ought to be able to cook whether she does it with her own hands or directs a servant.

What this country needs even more than libraries, missions, humane societies, peace leagues or picture galleries are practical common sense cooking schools where the wives of the present generation as well as the next can be taught to make the best possible use of food. Such instruction can not be too simple because it must appeal to a class that knows as much about chemistry as it does about Hebrew and Greek. The "high-falutin'" teaching in some schools does nothing but scare off a plain country woman or a girl with a limited education.

What we need to-day is to study our audience, then dispense with a lot of academic notions and get down to rational common sense in teaching the common tasks of life. First of all, make every girl and woman understand the dignity of household labor, and the necessity of wholesome, well-cooked food, then teach her to do every detail of the work as perfectly as it can be done. I believe that some day—and that day may not be so very far distant—every town and village will consider a cooking school as much of a necessity as a church. It will be free to all classes endowed or managed by the State, and the course of study instead of being elective will be compulsory.


