Rich Valley fair and horse-show activities continued during their scheduled four days last week, despite heavy rainfall during the weekend. Attendance grew as the events progressed and it was considered most successful. Your News reporter spent Thursday afternoon at the fair, mingling with the friendly folks and watching the activities when suddenly a big rain came up, but the spirits were not dampened.

Rich Valley folks not only like to put stress on horses but concentrate on all types of farm animals. Stables were filled with cattle, sheep, horses, mules and swine. Young Future Farmers of America lined the stable doors and fair grounds to exhibit agricultural projects.

**Clouds Open Up**  
The horseshow ring was occupied by energetic boys playing touch football until time for the draft horse and pulling contests. When the time came for these events the clouds opened for an interruption of rain.

The inclement weather stopped and contestants hitched their teams to a sled preparing for the pulling contest. Mules and horses carried pounds of sand bags with three trials to pull the load over 27 feet.

On the sidelines sheep were standing in stables, well-groomed. Their appearance was that of story book animals rather than regular farm livestock. Buster Barnes, one of the biggest sheep producers in the valley, was trimming some of his stock with care.

New farm machinery was displayed for agriculture enthusiasts around the showing sidelines.

**Best In History**  
J. T. Gardner, an official of the fair events, stated much of the folks summer had gone into planning the four days of activities. He believed the junior livestock and sheep shows were the best in the history of annual fairs. The pony show, however was low in attendance, a real disappointment to the good entries. Pitching a two hit game and striking out 17 men, Jerry Bark was the star of the contest.

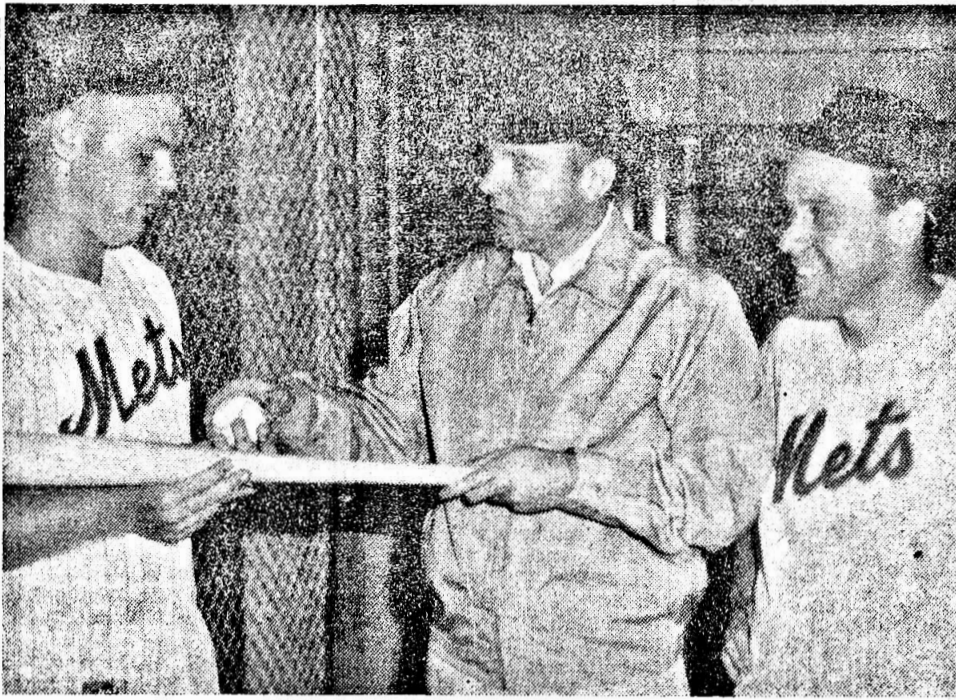

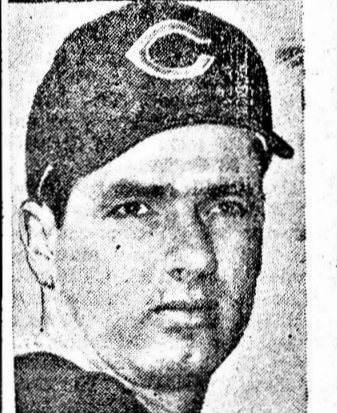

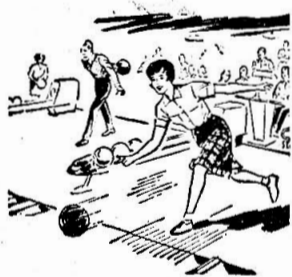
