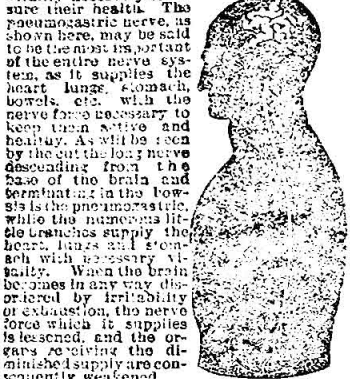

Bristol, Tenn., Oct. 7.—At a few minutes past 1 o'clock this morning train No. 5, from New York, on the Southern Railway, jumped the track.

SWEEP IN CONNECTICUT.

TOWN ELECTIONS RESULT IN A REPUBLICAN LANDSLIDE.

New Haven, Oct. 4.—Returns from 100 towns of Connecticut show unprecedented gains for the Republicans in the town elections.

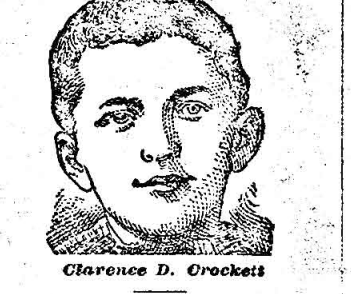

Gen. Walker's war record seems to have been all right, and the Democratic speakers in the ninth district are not attacking the Republican candidate very successfully on that point. But they claim to have discovered a weak spot in another part of his armor. 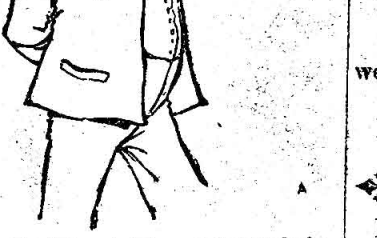

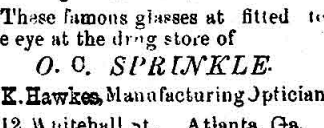

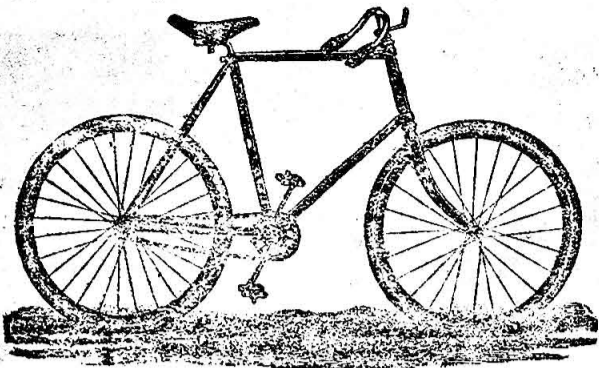

SUNDAY READING.

Christ Our Life, (Rev. E. W. Moore.)

"Christ our life." It is all in him. Let us look at it briefly in three aspects—life before us, life around us, life within us. Christ a life before us. "I am among you as one that serveth." He is the perfect object of our gaze. He has left us an example that we should follow his steps. "As the father hath sent me so send I you." He went forth in entire submission, in complete dependence, in simple trust. So let us follow him. I remember once hearing a farmer say he had a servant who was a very good man, but a very bad ploughman. When he was plowing, instead of fixing his eyes before him, continually looking back to see whether he had made a straight furrow. There are many Christians doing the same thing. We have to look away from our own walks off unto Jesus. "I have set the Lord always before me."

Once more, there is the life of Christ with us. We want power—power to cast out evil habits; to bring forth fruit unto God. That power is the indwelling of Christ. We have heard about the duty of "letting go." It is wonderful the tenacity with which the dead leaves of our old life seem to hang upon us. Sir John Lubbock has been lecturing upon "Leaves." He says the falling of leaves is really a process of life, not of death. To prove this he exhibited a twig. Half of it had been broken through, and half had remained in union with the trunk. This was done in the autumn. It was found that all the leaves on that part in union with the trunk fell off, but the leaves on the part where the life had been rendered held fast, and it needed considerable power to pull them off. There, I thought, is a picture of our old habits. How is it that you find Christians with so many world habits hanging about them? They say, "I cannot lay them aside! I have tried to cast them off, but I cannot." Shall I tell you the reason? You need to have your spiritual life deepened; to know not only what it is to have life, but "life more abundant." You are enfeebled because the flow of Christ's life has been checked, and you are not really living in union and fellowship with Christ. O, that to day we may receive him into our hearts that he may take possession of our whole being in power, not only to lay aside every weight, but to bring forth fruit unto God.

Should be Remembered.

The election for Congressmen takes place the first Tuesday in November—November 7, 1894.

Every voter must have his name on the registration books before October 27, 1894—10 days before election.

Every voter who has removed from one precinct or county to another must get a transfer at once from the precinct registrar and have it registered in the precinct in which he resides before October 27, 1894, else he cannot vote. Do not wait until October 27, but go immediately and register your name, or your transfer if you have removed since last election.

Section 78 of the election laws of Virginia states that "The registrar shall at any time previous to the regular days of registration, register any voter entitled to vote at the next succeeding election, who may apply to him to be registered."

Remember that October 27, 1894, is your last chance to register. Do not delay this duty until then. Go now and register.

Come early in the day to vote, and do your own voting. Do not let any one go in to the booth with you to do your voting. Freemen do their own voting.

REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.

Second.—We denounce the act of the Legislature of Virginia passed at the last session and known as the "Waiton Law," which allows only one constable to aid illiterate voters in preparing their ballots, as unjust and partisan in its intent; promotive of fraud and corruption in its results; and we pledge ourselves and our party to support no candidate for any office, Federal, State or municipal, who does not advocate its amendment in that particular.

Third.—We denounce the administration of Grover Cleveland as vacillating, weak and incompetent in its foreign policy; as incapable of directing the internal affairs of the Government; as inimical to the labor and material interests of this section in its selfish attempts to discriminate against our lumber, wool, coal, iron, and lead ores, by placing them on the free list, and at the same time giving protection to those manufacturers whom Mr. Cleveland was once pleased to denounce as "robbers." In its career of less than two years it has succeeded in unsettling values, crippling industries, paralyzing energy, depriving labor of its employment and just reward, and almost annihilating the values of our farms and factories. In striking contrast with this gloom and desolation, we point with pride to the growth and prosperity of the "New South" under Republican rule, when her waste places were built up, factories and furnaces organized and operated, wealth accumulated, and above all, labor actively and profitably employed.

Fourth.—We are opposed to trusts and monopolies of all kinds both foreign and domestic; but we especially oppose the Whitney Canadian Coal Trust and its allied foreign iron trust, which seek to destroy the raw materials of this district by allowing their coal and ore to enter our ports free of duty, regardless of the fact that Canada imposes a duty of over sixty cents a ton on all coal imported into her dominion from this country.

Fifth.—We are in favor of free coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1, and of the repeal of all laws which discriminate against the silver coin of the United States and tend to make gold the only standard value.

Sixth.—We are in favor of a tariff sufficient to protect home labor, home manufacturers, and home raw materials and especially coal, iron, wool and lumber against competition with cheap and degraded foreign labor and the products thereof; but so laid and adjusted as not to foster monopolies and trusts which build up gigantic fortunes for the few at the expense of the many.

Seventh.—The recent and corrupting influences of the Sugar trust in controlling democratic legislation justifies us in demanding that sugar be put on the free list.

Eighth.—We favor the enactment of laws excluding from our shores all immigrants except such as can produce satisfactory evidence of previous good character, and declare their intention of becoming permanent citizens of the United States in accordance with its Naturalization laws.
