### VIRGINIA CAPITOL IS UNDER HEAVY GUARD

Richmond, Va., March 26. — As a safeguard to the secrets and property of the State, Governor Stuart today placed the Capitol and State Library buildings under the care of watchmen and had all doors, save one, to each of the buildings placed under new locks and chains.

Governor Stuart issued the following order today:

March 26, 1917.

"Colonel John W. Richardson, Supt. of Grounds and Buildings, Capitol Building.

"Dear Sir:

"You will at once close firmly on the inside all entrances to the Capitol building, preferably with chains, excepting the north door to the basement, opposite the city hall, securing only enough keys to furnish one to me, one for yourself and one for each policeman. Have signs put on the other entrances giving directions as to the door that remains open. Have signs put on the inside of all other entrances stating that the door is closed by order of the Governor. Richard Blankenship will be in charge of the north door and will admit no persons except those he knows are employed in the building and those who have business here. The elevator will not be run at night and the night elevator man may operate in the day time. Instructions as to final closing hours for the day will be given you later. Instruct your policemen to see that all basement windows are fastened each evening.

### BROWNLOW WANTS TO ORGANIZE COMPANY

Bristol, Va., March 28.—"I am looking for 150 Virginians," said Frank Brownlow, a native of Abingdon, "who are willing, if need be, to die for their country's cause." This statement was made by a nephew of the late Congressman Walter Preston Brownlow, of the First Tennessee district. He is descended from a family of fighters. He was a non-commissioned officer in the Sixth Regiment of United States volunteers in the Spanish-American war, and was in service in Porto Rico. "I want to organize a company," he declared, "to be one of the aggregate of companies that must now be called into service to meet what to me seems to be one of the most important crises that has ever confronted our country."




