Dr. O. C. Sprinkle, 87, died about 6 a. m. this Thursday morning at his home in Marion following an illness of about a week.

Funeral will be held at 4 p. m. this Friday from the home, with Dr. Thompson Davis, pastor of Royal Oak Presbyterian Church, officiating. Burial will be in Round Hill Cemetery.

The family requests that no flowers be sent. Dr. Sprinkle had operated drug stores in Marion for about 65 years. He was a native of Smyth County and lived here all of his life with the exception of the time he spent in school in Baltimore, Md. He is survived by his widow, the former Miss Belle Painter, of Marion; two sons, Dr. Willis Sprinkle and Sidney Sprinkle, both Marion; three daughters, Mrs. Nick Carter and Mrs. Bob Allen, both of Charlotte, N. C., and Mrs. Phil Rafferty, Summit, N. J., and 17 grandchildren.

Light Vote Cast For Town Offices

Little interest was shown in any of the town elections in this area except in Chilhowie, where the incumbents won out in a hot fight, and in Trout Dale.

CHILHOWIE
Mayor, Kelly Berry was unopposed for reelection in the Chilhowie race. In the council race votes tabulated were J. B. Cole, 115; W. C. Nichols, 104; Fred H. Rector, 113; Richard E. Horne, 45; John D. Mason, 77, and L. S. Walker, 64.

MARION
Only write-in opposition was against the Marion incumbents. Howard Rash got nine write-in votes and Lenroy Asbury one for town recorder. Walter Jackson got 135 votes for mayor. Votes cast for councilmen were Kenneth Snider, 127; Joe Groseclose, 124; Wythe, Hull Jr., 127, and Beattie Gwyn, 124. H. P. Gills received 120 votes for recorder.

SALTVILLE
All Saltville incumbents were returned to office without opposition. J. Q. Peoples is mayor, and councilmen are J. M. Archer, J. W. Sauls, M. L. Bunts, W. J. Totten, Dr. R. D. Campbell and C. D. Shannon.

RURAL RETREAT
Charles Worley was elected mayor of Rural Retreat. Named to town council were Chester C. Bowling, Forrest L. F. Rhudy, Arthur Hayter Jr., C. Allen Davis, J. L. Reynolds and Dr. S. W. Huddle.

TROUT DALE
Voters in Trout Dale elected Carl G. Mitchell mayor with 47 votes to his opponent's, Claude V. Spence's 24. Roy M. C. Tolliver received 50 votes for town recorder to Lettie Spence's 23. Kline Barker polled 55 votes for town sergeant to Fred Testerman's 3.

The six men receiving the highest number of votes were named to town council. Votes in that race were J. T. Atwood, 65; J. C. Reedy, 62; J. L. Reedy, 58; Luther L. Tolliver, 44; Omar McGrady, 43; Ardie McGrady, 40; Ed Wagg, 29; Ed Westinghouse, 28; R. C. Wells, 24, and Wiley Mitchell, 7.

Approximately 200 firemen of Southwest Virginia are expected to gather in Marion this week end for the 1954 annual convention. The two day meeting will begin Friday afternoon, with registration at the Anderson Building, headquarters for the Marion firemen.

Chief Kenneth Snider of Marion this week invited the public to two of the outstanding meetings — Memorial services Friday night at the First Methodist Church and demonstrations on fire fighting Saturday afternoon in the open field near Brunswick-Balke-Collider plant.

The Memorial services will begin at 7 p. m. and will be in charge of the Galax Fireman's Auxiliary. Deceased members of fire departments throughout the area will be honored. The fire fighting demonstrations will begin at 3 o'clock and will be of interest to everyone, Chief Snider said.

"Qualified men who have made years of study in fire fighting and prevention will be on the program," he said. "The latest in fire fighting will be demonstrated and should be of interest to everyone. Industrial workers, business men, housewives, in fact, everyone should know what to do in an emergency. Getting on the job in seconds often means the difference between a tragedy and a minor blaze. Fire does not wait, but moves swiftly when it breaks out. If the general public educates itself on what to do before firemen arrive the loss can be cut down greatly. For this reason we are inviting the public to attend and urging everyone who can to see the demonstrations."

Snider pointed out that the spectacular demonstrations will include how to fight oil blazes and others which require smothering equipment rather than water. "Too often inexperienced persons try to put out a fire with the wrong equipment, resulting in spreading the blaze instead of getting it under control. For instance, plain baking soda thrown in a pan of burning grease will smother the blaze, while water will make it pop out and cause severe personal burns and possible spread to other inflammable materials, such as curtains, dish clothes and such."

The same is true of an oil fire, which will spread when water is put on the blaze instead of a smothering material found in most commercial fire extinguishers, the fire chief pointed out. "We will demonstrate how the public can help avert fires and help put out small blazes," he said. "These demonstrations should be of great benefit to everyone, so we suggest that everyone possible attend."

The demonstrations will be in charge of R. G. Repaire, sales engineer, Mine Safety Appliance Co., Charleston, W. Va., and R. Lawrence Oliver, state fire instructor, Richmond. The demonstration committee includes Hugh Worley, chairman, Clay Easterly, A. H. Wygal, Larry Waldrop, Chief Snider, S. C. Legarde and J. Nelson Berry.

Following the Memorial services Friday night a business meeting will be held at the Anderson Building, at which time Mayor Walter B. Jackson will welcome the visitors. Wilmer S. Noble, chairman, fire prevention committee on inflammable liquids for Henry County and Martinsville, will speak on "Fire Prevention in the Use of Flammable Liquids."

Saturday morning Repaire will speak on "Respiratory Protection," with a business session, President E. J. Ingram, Martinsville, in charge, following. A parade on Main St. will be held at 1:30, forming on Sheffey St. This will be followed by the public demonstrations.

Several social functions have been planned.

Richardson Appointed Treasurer



James B. Richardson was appointed Town of Marion treasurer at the regular meeting of the Town Council Friday night.

Richardson had been serving as deputy treasurer and prior to that was a deputy sheriff of Smyth County. The motion was made by K. K. Snider.

At this meeting Lt. Walter Boone of the Police Force was appointed acting chief, following the death of Chief Ralph Wolfe.

Council voted to purchase the land on the corner and running along East Cherry and Chestnut streets. The town will purchase five feet at an estimated cost of \$2.50 per square foot the total cost running to about \$2,300.

Council voted to construct a sidewalk on Iron Street between East Main and East South Alley on a 50-50 basis with the building owners on that street.

Continued on the agenda were the Fairground Hill sewer line, building code, town parking lot, rebuilding North Main, sewer right of way from J. Arthur Peery, change in the radio agreement with the county, alleviating traffic conditions central Marion, the curfew law and the purchase of a bulldozer.

Dentist For Schools Still Is Unsettled

County Board Bucks Pay For Travel

The Smyth County Board of Supervisors at its meeting this Tuesday received word from Dr. James Suter that the county will have to pay travel expenses to and from Abingdon and furnish the noon meal for the dentist who is supposed to work in the county.

Board members voted to abide by the agreement with the state department in which the dentist was to be paid \$250 by the county but refused to agree to the added expense. J. Leonard Mauck told the board that he had advised Dr. Suter that the dentist should try to find a place in Smyth County to live.

Board members also authorized Mr. Mauck to secure materials for putting a ceiling over the Community Room in Groseclose so that it can be used as a voting place. Residents of the area will install the ceiling and furnish a stove.

Board members passed a resolution to the state board of education stating that the school board will pay not less than two per cent and more than four per cent for the money to be borrowed for school construction.

At the request of Clerk of Court Lloyd E. Currin the board voted to purchase a new mimeographing machine.

Commonwealth's Attorney Charles H. Funk was authorized to buy a new Royal typewriter for his office. Mr. Funk pointed out that in the 19 years he has held the office the only equipment the county has furnished his office is a small table.

W. Z. Ford of the Marion office of Leslie A. Kimble appeared in connection with the yearly audit of the county books, stating that his firm's price would be a little less than it was last year. There was some discussion about getting the auditor of public accounts for the audit next year.

Sheriff Pat Jennings asked that deputy sheriffs be relieved of checking on deer damage claims, since they no longer serve as deputy game wardens. The board appointed Rudolph Earnest, John Currin and Oscar Pierce to serve in addition to the present men examining damage. They will be paid at the rate of \$3 a claim in their district and \$3.50 outside their district.

Marion Mayor Walter B. Jackson was present for the discussion concerning the town-county radio set up. Since the first of the year the state has been authorized to pay two-thirds of the cost of operating the main station as well as the mobile units. Board authorized the sheriff to work out a contract between the state, county and town, with the county to continue paying \$75 of the night operator's salary.

Walter Stuart, Tom Phillips and Frank Duncan requested the supervisors to enter an order approving the closing to the streets and alleys in the Henrytown subdivision, Mathieson Chemical Co. now owns all of the section except two lots which belong to Harry Atherton, who is granted a right of way with a cattle guard and gate from the area.

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Town Council Appoints Tuesday Is Last Day for Getting Budget Committee At Friday Night Meeting

Marion Town Council appointed a committee to draw up the budget for the approval of the council at the next meeting at the regular meeting Friday night.

The committee consisted of Mayor Walter Jackson, H. P. Gills, recorder; James Ritter, engineer; and James Richardson, treasurer. The proposed budget will be for the coming year and will be discussed at the next regular meeting. The budget must be published 30 days prior to time for effect of the outline.

The council gave permission to have the town books audited. The council voted to give \$15 to the Marion Garden Club for mowing the plot at the Norfolk and Western Railroad station. The mayor was given power to interview and hire a patrolman for the police force. This motion was made by K. K. Snider, in view of the need for an extra during the vacation period.

The proposal to have the town garbage contracted to private firms was dropped. The request for curb and gutter and sidewalk by the homes of William S. Meek and Elmer Sturgill on Cumberland Street was referred to the street committee. The surface treatment program for 1954 was turned over to have the council inspect the proposed outline. The application for a taxi permit by Lonnie Hall was continued.

It was ordered that the council approve action of Mayor Jackson in securing land lease agreement with the US Forest Service concerning the watershed around the town spring.

A committee of Mayor Jackson, Beattie Gwyn, and Wythe Hull was appointed to draw up a suitable resolution regarding the late J. Blaine Richardson and Chief Ralph Wolfe.

Those present for the meeting were Joe Groseclose, Mr. Snider, George Greer, Jake Andrews, Mr. Gwyn, Mr. Hull, Mayor Jackson, H. P. Gills, recorder, and Mr. Ritter.

State Troopers this week urged all Smyth citizens who have not had their cars inspected to do so at once, with the deadline being next Tuesday.

576 Children Get Innoculations During Month

A total of 576 shots was given children in Smyth County during the month of May by County Health Department personnel, the monthly report of the department shows.

Included in this total are 274 diphtheria toxoid, 268 small-pox vaccinations and 34 tetanus and pertussis shots.

Cases of various diseases reported during the month include one hepatitis, 16 measles, six scarlet fever and one polio.

Activities of the staff reported show 71 chest x-rays, 34 home nursing visits in tuberculosis control, one patient admitted to sanatorium, four visits in cancer control, 25 visits in orthopedic service, three orthopedic patients at clinic, four rheumatic fever patient visits, rheumatic fever patient visits in maternal and child health program, five patient visits to maternal and child health clinic and four home nursing visits to school children.

Other items are 43 laboratory reports received, 74 home visits in general sanitation, 15 septic tanks completed and approved, nine inspections of food establishments, 11 inspections of dairies, two inspections of milk product plants, 13 complaints investigated, six nuisances abated and 24 samples of milk collected for laboratory analyses.

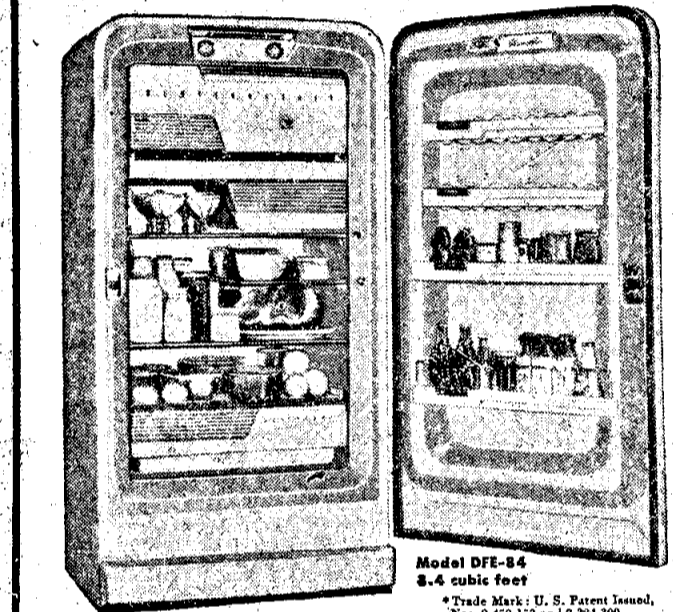

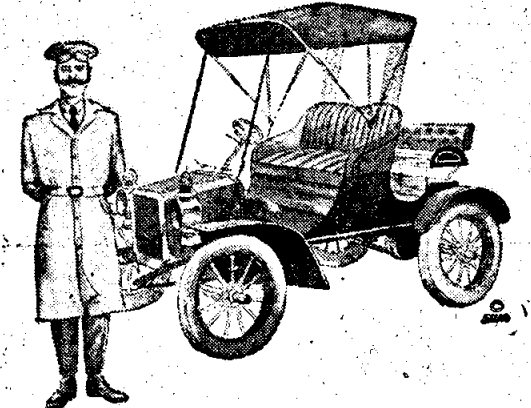

I do not agree with a word you say, but I will defend to the death your right to say it!

JUVENILES AT WORK

Last fall we took the stand that our present labor laws prohibiting the working of youths under 16 in business establishments — at soda fountains and such, perhaps should be changed to allow deserving youngsters the chance to make their own spending money.

It was and is our contention that properly supervised short working hours for these deserving youngsters is better for them than loafing, too often in undesirable places, when not in school.

Most of the boys and girls desiring such work come from marginal income families and too often are denied the little extras which their fellow students in school enjoy. They do not have the money for party clothes, dates and such which definitely are a part of school life.

As a result, we contend, they become maladjusted and the so called welfare state hinders their development rather than making life easier and better.

We definitely are against child labor and sweat shops. We abhor the idea of the old London chimney sweeps or even the scrawny youngsters of our nation doing the work of men, a common occurrence just a few years ago.

The laws no doubt were formulated to do away with such practices, and God forbid that we ever again allow such to blot our national character. However, these same laws, designed to protect the youngsters, are harming many of them.

This past week editors of the New York Mirror boosted our contention with a long article on the subject in the magazine section of the Sunday edition.

Written by Joseph Johnston, the article traces the beginning of laws to curb abuses of child labor, with the present day ills resulting from these laws.

Briefly, the article traces the beginning of the National Child Labor Committee at the turn of the century and its progress until 1938, when child labor laws were enacted which protected our young citizens against exploitation by child labor.

But, according to the article, there are leaders and authorities in the fields of economy, sociology, industry, child guidance and education who insist that the pendulum has swung too far . . . that restrictions imposed by both state and federal legislation are robbing our youth of initiative, ambition, enterprise, sense of social responsibility and realization of the value of money.

Johnston contends and backs up his contention by other authorities on the subject that present laws are keeping our youngsters from learning to do a job, are developing slipshod work habits and downright aversion to the discipline or regular employment.

Mrs. Getrude Folks Simand, present general chairman of the NCLC, backs this up by making a distinct difference between child labor and child employment. The first embraces long hours in factories, mines and such, while the latter concerns part time jobs during idle hours in surrounding conclusive to teaching the youngsters habits they will need in adult life.

The article sums up findings that the choice of employment is, at any time, whether during school or vacation periods, extremely limited, to the "real detriment of the children the safeguards are designed to benefit."

The Labor Department has an inspector of this area who evidently does not believe in this trend but in the enforcement of the law to the letter bringing to court well meaning business men of Smyth County who are trying to help these youngsters. We disagreed with her last fall and today continue to disagree with her bureaucratic interpretations of the laws governing the working of youngsters.

SUMMER INSECTS

Marion citizens last summer during the dreadful polio epidemic learned that insects which normally swarm down on the public during the hot months can be controlled.

During the height of the epidemic town officials sprayed the entire town and surrounding communities a couple of times with an insecticide. Mathieson Chemical Co. of Saltville has a portable machine which was used for the job, and definite results were obtained.

For several days after the spraying there were no flies or mosquitoes to pester our citizens. It was possible to eat outdoors and sit for several hours on cool porches without being bothered with insects. And there definitely was a complete shortage of insects from the first spraying until summer's end.

The cost was not too high, compared with results. Figured from a per capita standpoint, it was just a few cents for each person. And there probably is not a single person in the community who would not be willing to pay twice that much, personally, in order to be rid of the bothersome pests.

Spray jobs sufficient to control flies and mosquitoes would be a welcome sight this summer as far as most citizens of Marion are concerned.

Dear Sir:

We have read your excellent editorial "Speed and Wrecks" in your edition of May 27 and thank you very much for bringing this matter to public attention.

However, the situation is even more dangerous than it appears from the editorial. You gave the correct braking distances (official tests vary a little but to no great consequence) but for the stopping distance reaction time must be added. This is the time it takes for danger to register on a driver's mind and for him to apply his brakes. It is usually three-fifths of a second but can vary upward according to the physical condition of a driver. During this three fifths

of a second a car can cover a good deal of ground and this distance must be applied if we are to know how much distance is needed in which to stop a car. Consequently, to arrive at this, the braking distance figures you give expand into 43 for 20 mph, 80 for 30 mph, 126 for 40 mph, 183 for 50 mph, 251 for 60 mph, 329 for 70 mph and 416 for 80 mph when we calculate stopping distance. These are bad enough, but normal. Various adverse conditions of the road, the car or the driver can make them far worse.

Your assistance is very much appreciated and I hope you will not consider this in any sense a criticism.

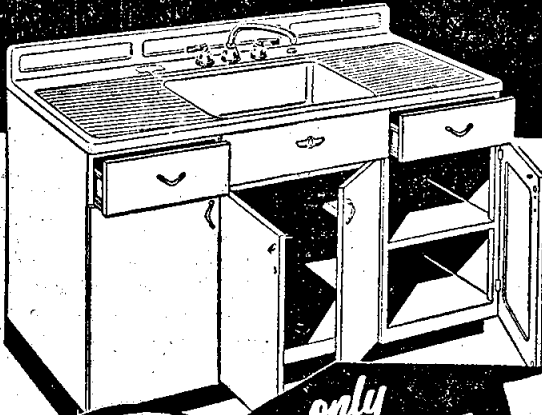

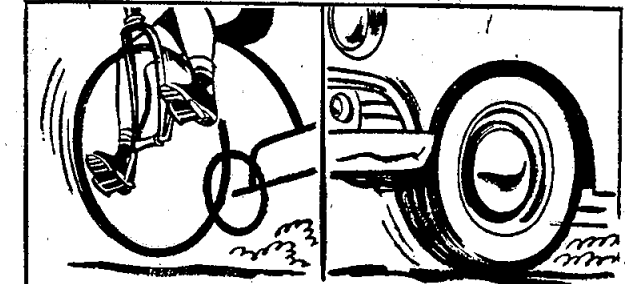

Car Owner Is Given Suspended Sentence In Reckless Case

The law holding a car owner responsible for acts of a driver directed to get under the wheel by the owner was invoked Monday in Trial Justice Court at Marion.

Earnest Frank Evans of the Walker's Creek section was found guilty of reckless driving and fined \$10 and costs and given 12 months, time suspended, as a result of a youth's driving a vehicle in his possession in a reckless manner.

Judge W. V. Birchfield told the young man that the time was being suspended providing ownership of the car is straitened out and further providing he is able to get proper insurance on the vehicle. The bench warrant was taken after testimony was heard in court. Albert Bradley Gross was charged with reckless driving and driving with no permit. Evans was charged with allowing an unlicensed person to drive and being drunk in public.

State Trooper S. M. Norris stated that Sunday afternoon he was cruising west on Highway 11, just west of Marion, when he saw a vehicle pull out on the highway and drive off in a hurry. He gave chase and during the run he said, the car swerved off the road and across the double line at several points.

The officer said that when he stopped the car Gross was driving and Evans sitting in the car drunk. Norris said that he brought Evans to jail and that Gross, who started arguing also, was taken to the police station. Both were drinking, but Gross was not drunk, he said. A pint bottle about half full was found in the car.

General talk among the officers, Commonwealth's Attorney Andy Funk and Judge W. V. Birchfield revealed that a cousin of the Gross youth had been charged with driving under the influence after being arrested driving the same vehicle.

Evans has lost his driving permit and license privileges in Virginia due to previous trouble. He has had the car in Maryland. After returning to Virginia the vehicle was put in his wife's name. It is now in his brother's name. He admitted owning the car, telling court that it was used by all his family.

Another reckless driving charge was dismissed after the complainant stated that the youth involved was not driving on the highway when the alleged act was committed, but in his service station.

"It was what?" Judge W. V. Birchfield asked, desiring to be brought up to date on all new fangled deals in court.
"Bargain day. You see, when court is big they get your lawyer to advise you to plead guilty and let you off with a suspended sentence."
So the matter stood. Firestone got a bargain in West Virginia court.
But he did not fare so well in Marion court. He and his wife were charged with assault upon a neighbor, Ted Hall, up on Pearl Ave., Marion. Hall took out a warrant after a scrap Sunday, charging Mrs. Firestone with an assault and her husband with threatening to kill with a gun.

and she followed him, starting to fight again.
Mrs. Hall said that the day the Firestones moved in that he came to her house wanting to borrow a broom. She said that he started talking and asked about the neighbors, pulling a gun and saying, "If the neighbors ain't all right, I got this to take care of them."
Another neighbor testified that there had been trouble ever since they moved in. He told of a previous scrap, at which time Firestone yelled at his wife to "Cut her head off." Mrs. Firestone was scrapping with a young girl at that time, and there was a constant uproar in the neighborhood, caused, he said, by the newcomers.
Mrs. Firestone claimed that Hall was drawing back his fist to hit the boy and that she ran between them to keep "them from fighting on Sunday." Both she and her husband denied the gun deal.
Firestone also denied telling Mrs. Hall that he had the gun to take care of the neighbors, admitting that he did tell her that his wife had a temper and that "We have a lot of trouble, and the neighbors will have to get used to us."
Apparently the neighbors cannot get used to the couple. They were given \$50 and costs fines each and six months each, all except costs suspended, providing they leave the community. A gun taken from the home by officers was forfeited.

Dog Owners Asked To Keep Animals Away from Stock

Smyth County game wardens this week requested cooperation of dog owners in controlling their bothering sheep and other livestock.

Complaints have been received in large numbers recently of dogs chasing and damaging sheep and livestock, they said. This has been especially true in the Saltville area, where a sign asking control of dogs has been posted by Deputy Game Warden Walter Lamie.

Provisions of Section 70, authorizing the killing of such dogs, will have to be invoked unless they are kept under better control, the notice states.

Section 70 states that it is "the duty of any warden who may find a dog in the act of killing, injuring, worrying or chasing sheep, or killing or injuring other livestock, to kill

said dog forthwith whether such dog bears a tag or not." Any person finding a dog committing any of these acts also has the right to kill the animal under this section.

Lamie's notice follows: "Complaint having been made by various persons pasturing livestock in and near Saltville that their livestock is being damaged through loss of weight and loss of milk by being frequently chased by dogs, this is to notify you of your responsibility in the matter.

"Unless you take the necessary steps to prevent further damage of this kind, it will necessarily result in the killing of dogs for which you have an affection and may result in your having to pay damage to the livestock owners."

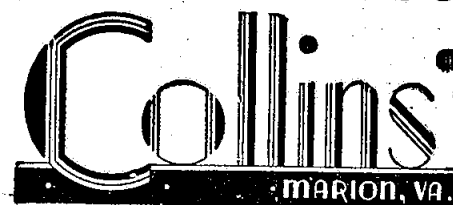

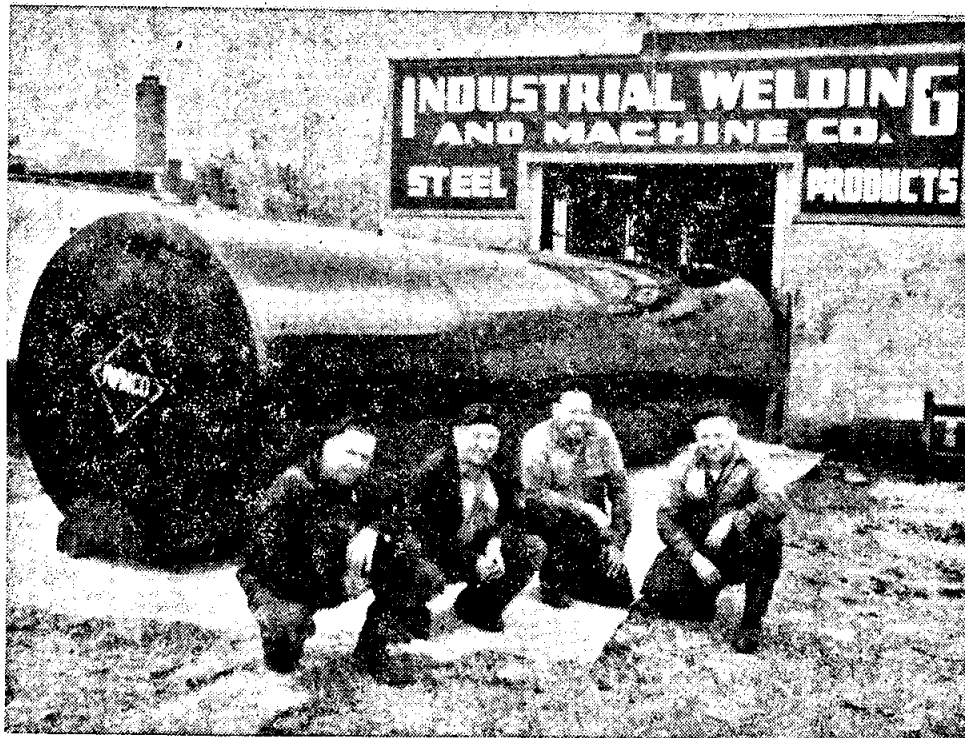

Teacher Retires After 45 Years

F. M. Eversole of Rich Valley is rounding out 45 years of active service in the teaching profession and this year has put away his chalk and report cards, but is keeping his fond memories of classroom work.

Mr. Eversole was honored at the close of this year's session by his fellow teachers at Rich Valley High School with a steak dinner at Hungry Mother Park. A big traveling bag was given the lifelong teacher and missionary.

"This bag is only to be used for visiting purposes and not for shaking Rich Valley dust from your shoes," Principal Ray Buchanan told the honored guest.

Mr. Eversole has taught in Virginia, Texas and Korea, spending many years in the orient before returning to the United States.

"My greatest satisfaction is in thinking of the multitude of former pupils who have been and are faithfully serving their generations as homemakers, farmers, teachers, preachers, businessmen, industrialists and such," he said. "I take great pride in the accomplishments

of my pupils, whether I had anything to do with it or not". Those who are interested in far away places and love to dream of worldwide conquests take great delight in talking with Mr. Eversole. In 1912 he went to Chunu, Korea, remaining there until 1930 as teacher and missionary.

He taught in a school for boys there and many of the leaders for democracy in Korea.

rea today learned their first lessons in ethics and the sacred rights of man from this kind Virginian who had forsaken his home to help others.

Recalling some of these men who have fought so long for their country and its development, Mr. Eversole takes pride in knowing that he has done what he could to further education and freedom in the oppressed country.

There was one who persisted in learning the English language to perfection. He went to China and, disguised as a native of that country, succeeded in getting to the United States for schooling. After graduating from Harvard University he came back to Korea and devoted his life to helping his

native land. Another one of his pupils came to this country for an education by another route, Homer Rodehaver, music instructor for Evangelist Billy Sunday, was with Sunday in Korea while on a world tour. He was impressed with one of the teachers at the school and his voice, sending the young man to Chicago Conservatory of Music for more training. Teacher Hyun returned to Korea and played a big part in developing church music in his country.

After returning to the United States Mr. Eversole continued his mission work until 1933. He taught for two years at the Tex-Mex Institute in Kingsville, Tex., a school for Mexican boys from Texas and Mexico.

His first year of teaching was while still a student at Hampden-Sydney, where he was doing graduate work. He was employed as a tutor in Greek and Latin for boys unprepared in these subjects in high school.

In 1901-02 he was teacher at Potomac Academy, also coaching football. In 1903 he was principal and high school teacher at Pleasant Groves in Rich Valley.

In 1907 Mr. Eversole took part as principal at Robbinsville Academy, a home mission school in Graham County, N. C. He also was the Presbyterian minister for the county and remained at these jobs until 1910.

The teacher came to Chilhowie and was principal of the school for the 1910-11 term and the next year taught English and Greek at King College. The following year he went to Korea.

After two years in Texas he returned to his native state, serving as teacher and principal at McCready school in 1935-36. He next went to Allison Gap School, remaining there as principal and high school teacher until 1942.

That year he came to Rich Valley, where he has been teaching up until his retirement. "I love to sit back and think of my former Smyth County pupils," the elderly teacher says. "For instance, there is Robert Stamper, today known as Dr. Stamper and teacher of Bible at King College. He was a Navy chaplain for 10 years and is one of our outstanding religious leaders of Southwest Virginia. At Allison Gap he was one of my mischievous pupils, forever squirming and getting into trouble. He and I both chuckle today over the thrashing I gave him for throwing spitballs. Neither

of us were chuckling then, but one never can tell." Others remembered by him include Miss Minnie Rouse, one of Smyth's better known and well loved teachers; Everett Bonham, successful apple grower and businessman of Chilhowie, who was given special instruction in geometry in order that he might enter Roanoke College, and George Cook successful lawyer.

Mr. Eversole received his first formal education at Ivanhoe. Then he moved to Rural Retreat, attending public school, Greaver Academy and Hawkins Chapel.

He received his BA from Hampden-Sydney in 1900 and his MA from the same school in 1901. He also has done graduate work at East Tennessee State Teacher's College and King College.

"His active days as a teacher were concluded at the end of this session, but his influence will be felt all over the world for years," Mr. Buchanan said in praise of a man who has spent his life trying to help others.
